What matters is the response to them. In our case, I have every confidence that the resiliency and cooperative spirit that have marked our approach to past challenges will see us through once again.

As we embark on this all-important year, I especially ask that we never lose sight of who we are and what we are about. We need to intersperse hard work with fun, to nurture one another in our individual spiritual journeys, to support our children's religious education program, and to expand our commitment to social justice. Let's never get so bogged down in committee work and operational details that we lose sight of our vision statement, carefully crafted this year after extensive congregational input. "Our purpose," that statement reads, "is to be a thriving, caring and welcoming community that supports each person's spiritual

journey, embraces diversity, challenges us to live responsibly, and is a catalyst for a just and compassionate world."

In the end, it isn't really about growth in membership numbers. It's about the energy, commitment and enthusiasm that attract others to a vibrant organization and thus generate growth. I look around me and see that energy, commitment and enthusiasm in abundance among us. Here's to an exciting new year for the Unitarian Fellowship of West Chester!

NOTES FROM UNDERGROUND: RELIGIOUS EDUCATION UPDATE

Welcome back to another year of exploring in our Religious Education (RE) Program! Even if you have been attending services during the summer, you will find many changes in RE this fall.

First, things look different downstairs. Thanks to a huge amount of work on the part of Tilo Stahl, Bob Radcliffe and the other members of the Building Committee, and to a host of volunteers, here's what has been accomplished during the past three months.

1. The entire basement floor has been repainted. (Visit www.ufwc.org to see photos of Bob and Tilo in their HAZMAT suits and respirators!)

2. The doors and woodwork have been painted.

3. The kitchen has been transformed into a classroom.

4. Kitchen facilities (not completely finished by the time this goes to press) have been set up in the side hallway.

5. An office for the DRE is being created.

Second, with the start of double services, we are making changes to the way we do RE. For children from Pre-Kindergarten through 6th grade, we will be implementing "Way Cool Sunday School." In this model, the first Sunday of each month will be multi-aged Group RE focusing on our 7 Principles and Purposes, the second Sunday will be a multi-aged Social Action project, and the remaining Sundays will be regular classroom days. I will post the year's calendar on the bulletin board in the hallway downstairs.

The 7th & 8th grade class (Neighboring Faiths) will meet at 9:00 a.m. only.

The 9th grade class (Coming of Age) will also meet at just one service; the time has not yet been determined.

Some dates to mark on your calendar:

Sunday, September 11 — Our traditional Intergenerational Ingathering service. Double services begin, 9:00 and 11:00.

Wednesday, September 14, 6:30 p.m. — Teacher Orientation & Pizza. Details have been emailed to teachers. If you did not receive the information, please contact me.

Sunday, September 18 — RE Program begins. We will have a combination of Group RE and class day. **NEW THIS YEAR:** We will have a **PARENT ORIENTATION** between services. Please come and learn more about the program your child(ren) will be involved in, ask questions about Way Cool Sunday School, meet teachers, and fill out Registration Forms. We'll also review the RE "Rules of the Road," so that you can help your children know what is expected/hoped of them on Sundays.

Friday, September 30 — Our first RE Family Social – pizza and bingo. We'll post more information about this event as we get closer to the date.

You'll be seeing their smiling faces at the podium soon. Thanks also to Gerry Giess for undertaking the task of scheduling service coordinators in the coming year.
- Add comforts backstage for a ministers' "quiet space". This task is essentially complete.
- Examine ways music enhances the service experience. The Fellowship's new Music Committee has been seeking a choir director

and a hymnist and is planning for our choir's needs. That committee and ours have a joint panel, to consider new paths to integrate music into our services. Elaine Friedlander, Jane Krick and Marie Steele represent the Music Committee. Alan Pittenger, panel chair, Robin Garrett and John Orban represent Religious Services. Our thanks go to them, and we anticipate some interesting new ideas.

- Consider how to alleviate congestion during Coffee Hour. With fewer people at each of two services, we will eliminate some chairs at the back of the Sanctuary. However, we expect attendance to increase after we begin double services, so we are pleased that the Building Committee plans to enclose and upgrade the porch area to address this concern soon. Due to scheduling and budgetary concerns, the porch renovation got reduced priority, but we hope it can be complete before congestion again becomes an issue. Finally, on behalf of the

Religious Services Committee (John Orban and myself, co-chairs; Dena Beeghly, Robin Garrett, Gerry Giess, Sue Johnston and Alan Pittenger) and the Fellowship at large, let me extend grateful acknowledgement to Rev. We've had endless discussion with him in planning for this new endeavor, and he has shown gracious outright enthusiasm for what promises to be, for him, quite a taxing Sunday schedule, indeed. IF YOU VALUE COFFEE HOUR...HELP US MAKE IT HAPPEN

While many of the elements are in place to make double services a success, one very vital ingredient is missing – volunteers to make coffee after the first and second services.

In the past, one volunteer (Cheryl Pittenger) has been solely responsible for making the coffee. She has been very dedicated to the task, which she has accomplished quietly every Sunday without fanfare. On behalf of the entire Fellowship, I extend my thanks to Cheryl.

With two services and a growing membership, however, a single dedicated volunteer can no longer be expected to take care of coffee. Ideally, what we need is someone who will coordinate the overall effort, soliciting and “signing up” one set of volunteers to put on the coffee before 9 a.m. and a second set of volunteers to clean up after the 9 a.m. service and put on a fresh pot for 11 a.m. These details could be worked out more fully later — It is possible, for instance, that the 9 a.m. volunteer could prepare TWO pots, plug in one and let the other standing for the second service volunteer to simply plug in.

The coordinator would also make sure that volunteers know where to find instructions for setting up and making the coffee. (They are in the cabinet with the coffee supplies.)

Both the coordination and the actual coffee making are not big jobs. But they are vital to our Sunday experience because coffee hour represents the opportunity to socialize and greet members and guests. This is our “welcoming time”; without it, we are miss-

ing an important element necessary not only for growth but also for the sense of community that defines our Fellowship.

PARKING

Several issues have arisen regarding parking on Sunday mornings.

First, for some time we have been using the virtually unlimited free parking at the new university parking garage on Sharpless Street. Unfortunately, the university has now installed a 24/7 automated fee system for the garage. The charge is \$1 for an hour or for any portion thereof. If you want to park in the garage for Sunday services, you must take a ticket to activate the entrance gate on your way in. You insert that ticket and the required number of dollars in a machine when you wish to leave. On most Sundays (with no meetings afterwards), the cost adds up to \$2. If you can afford the cost and enjoy the convenience of the university garage, you are encouraged to continue to use it.

You may also use the outside parking area in front of the university garage, or you may park along Sharpless Street. There is no fee for either of those areas on a Sunday morning. Spaces are limited, however.

Our other alternative is the Verizon lot. Unfortunately, there have been concerns raised by Verizon employees who could not exit that lot during recent after-work or weekend hours because their vehicles were blocked. We suspect that Fellowship members did not cause the problem; other people also use the lot. Still, we ask that you exercise caution to be sure you do not block in any vehicles when parking in the Verizon lot.

Working together and exercising care, we should be able to assure sufficient parking for our existing members and guests. Our move to double services this fall will help.

Mon: Meetings with your elected officials between 9 am and 3 pm (appointments arranged by UUSC)

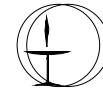

CHRISTIAN INTEREST GROUP

The September meeting of the Christian Interest Group will be held on Wednesday, September 21 at the Fellowship. We will discuss "Weighing the Scriptures", a concept described by Gulley and Mulholland in their book *If Grace is True* (p. 51) as, "discerning which Scriptures accurately reflect God's character." (You need not have read this book to participate in this discussion.)
