

FROM YOUR INTERIM MINISTER

Did you know that the Unitarian Fellowship of West Chester has a Committee on Ministry? Its members are Kora Stahl, John Orban, Mary Hepokoski and Shelly Case. So, what does the Committee on Ministry do? The Committee on Ministry examines the relationships within the congregation and its overall ministry, lay and vocational. At times the Committee on Ministry brings forth concerns to the minister about issues that need to be addressed. At times the Committee on Ministry examines the overall spirit of the congregation and makes suggestions about future programs or events that might strengthen the relationship between congregants, and congregants and the minister.

One of the most important functions of the Committee on Ministry is as a conduit between congregants and the minister. Sometimes Committee on Ministry members will create a space where the minister and congregants can talk when conflict arises.

As a minister I have found that the Committee on Ministry is one of the most important committees of the church. Besides working with minister and congregant relations, it helps the minister reflect on what is working in the church and what is not. Sometimes I have shared my thoughts on a certain problem, and the Committee on Ministry members have helped me deal with it constructively. When I am handling something particularly well it is often due to a Committee on Ministry meeting in which I presented a problem and was given ideas. It is like having five minds and spirits instead of only one!

Over the course of the past year the Committee on Ministry has helped this congregation immensely in ways that cannot be quantitatively measured. At times they have prevented me from making mistakes, encouraged new ways of ministering to one another, passed on sermon and programming ideas, and examined the continuing spirit of this congregation as it moves through the transitions of interim ministry.

In our Unitarian Universalist tradition, ministry is a shared undertaking. Ours are the traditions of the priesthood and prophethood of all believers. Each of us ministers to another. Beyond the numbers and sundry details, we measure our spiritual lives by the connections that we make, the people we have helped, the people who gave us strength to go on.

I have shared this information about the Committee on Ministry because everyone in the church needs to know about this important committee. I have shared this information because I am so grateful for their ministry to this congregation.

FROM THE PRESIDENT

Congratulations and thanks to everyone involved in initiating double services! From what I observed, everything ran smoothly when we came together for the new church year on September 11. Attendance was fairly evenly divided between the 9 a.m. and the 11 a.m. services (a combined total of over 100), and the extra breathing room in the sanctuary was a welcome change. Our hard work over the spring and summer months paid off.

For the leadership and a large number of our members, however, the church year really began two weeks earlier, on August 28, with the visit from our growth consultant, the Rev. Tom Chulak. I have to admit that I was a bit apprehensive over the turnout at this service – Unitarians do like their summer weekends, and this was the last one before Labor Day. But you came out in droves, and exhibited the same high level of energy and enthusiasm that has marked our congregation for the past year. It was a wonderful way to launch what will be a very important new year for us.

As you know, Rev. Chulak met with the Fellowship leadership after the service. The chairs and/or co-chairs of just about every committee were present at this workshop. We were able to identify six major areas that we will address with assistance from Rev. Chulak. They include governance, leadership development, identity, spiritual development, public witness/outreach/social justice, and public communications/marketing. We are now in the process of appointing a Bridging Team to work with Rev. Chulak on strengthening our Fellowship in these areas as we

grow. I expect the team to be in place shortly and to announce the membership in next month's Fellowship. They will be reporting to the Board with, hopefully, recommendations and suggested changes in our structure that are more in keeping with a larger, program-sized congregation.

In some areas, we are already making progress. As I write this, Board Vice President Bob Scott is in the process of organizing a meeting of the Fellowship Council. The Council, consisting of the chairs or co-chairs of all major committees, will meet once every other month to discuss common issues and concerns, thereby greatly improving cross-communications within the Fellowship. In addition, the Council will be working on developing procedures for our Fellowship operation and on either revising existing job descriptions or writing new ones. The Council will thus serve as the operational arm of the Fellowship, freeing up the

Board to concentrate on long-term goals and develop strategies for meeting the many challenges we face.

Finally, I want to address a question that has been asked of me several times over the summer months. Members new and old are concerned that growth will mean a loss in identity for us. There's no denying that many things will have to change and are already changing, as detailed in this column. But I do not believe our basic values or that elusive quality you might call "personality" will change. We are a resilient, adaptive, creative, caring, warm and dedicated congregation of people with diverse religious beliefs, committed to supporting one another in our life's journeys. You can add your own adjectives. The point is, we are uniquely us, and always will be.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEETING SEPT 13, 2005

Jim McFadyen, representing the Ministerial Search Committee, met with the Board. The need for an employment agreement to be offered to prospective ministers was discussed. The Board approved the creation of a committee to draft a letter of agreement for a settled minister.

The Board also approved the following appointments to the new Bridging Team: Bruce Koepcke as Chair, Rob Sartain as a member, and Bob Scott as Board liaison. One or two more members will be recruited for the team, which will work with the Fellowship Council, the Board, and the Growth Consultant.

The issue of the lack of a proper office for the minister was discussed. A motion was passed to the effect that the Board recognizes this issue and intends to make it a priority within two years of the hire of the new minister. In the interim, partitions may be installed in the business office to provide a more private workspace for the minister.

No Secretary's Report was submitted to the *Fellowtarian* in August. The Board passed motions at its August meeting authorizing extra compensation for the hymnist and the choir director.

NOTES FROM UNDERGROUND RELIGIOUS EDUCATION UPDATE

At about the time you receive this issue of the *Fellowtarian*, we will have just had our first RE Sunday of the year, and our first experience in RE of double services. Regarding that, there are several things in particular I want to share with you this month. The first is that with two services, and not seeing all of our friends at the same service, we are renewing our commitment to planning RE Family Fun events throughout the year, when we can all be together, keep friendships going and make new friends as we grow. Our first event is Indoor Camping and Bingo on Friday night, October 28, when we'll be turning the sanctuary into a campground. All you'll need is a stand-alone tent, sleeping bag, air mattress or sleeping bag pad, your "jammies" and a flashlight. We can promise no mosquitoes and plenty of fun. I'll be emailing more details when the RE Committee has the plans finalized.

The second thing is that in conjunction with the Social Justice Task Force we are looking into starting a drive to help the people displaced by Hurricane Katrina. We'll send out more information by email as we pull the details together.

Third, with the extra work involved in running two RE sessions on Sunday mornings, it is more important than ever that all parents get involved. Many of you are already teaching, but we need Floating Volunteers and classroom aides to assist several times during the year. This involves no special skills, just a willingness to help out. Cathy Vogt is coordinating the RE Volunteers. Please contact her to schedule a few Sundays.

Finally, a tremendous thank-you to all the teachers (20 out of 24!) who were able to attend Teacher Orientation on September 14. Some even arrived after other meetings they had to attend elsewhere that evening, in order to meet with their team members to plan the year's schedule. There was a lot of energy in evidence, a lot of ideas shared, and I know that we will have another excellent RE year. Thanks to the members of the RE Committee who helped plan and run the orientation. Thanks also to Reverend Larry for joining us for pizza, salad and brownies before the meeting got underway, and for opening the gathering with some heartfelt words reminding us of the mission of teaching our young people and the gift that our teachers give to everyone in the Fellowship.

YOUTH GROUP UPDATE SEPTEMBER AND OCTOBER 2005

The Youth Group is off to a rousing start. We kicked off our new year with the first meeting on Sunday, September 11, with a lot of energy and some fabulous plans for the year. These plans include having our youth take a much larger role in planning and carrying out activities, projects and stuff. We are looking at big things — like a haunted basement, a \$2,000 AIDS Walk contribution goal with a T-shirt sale, a trip to Boston in the spring, more Battles of the Bands, and trips to other churches to participate in youth CON events.

What can you accomplish? Let's congratulate Anita Stahl, as an example. Of her own accord, she identified a need, massive starvation in Niger, a country in western Sub-Saharan Africa. She planned and conducted a fabulous program at the Fellowship, complete with a guest speaker, a raffle, and light snacks. This single night fundraiser brought in over \$1,600 to be sent to the World Food Program. Sounds like Anita not only did an amazingly cool thing, but she may have just fulfilled her Senior Project requirements at the same time. Very cool!!

What's next? In October, we'll go to two CON events, participate in the Philly AIDS walk, haunt the basement in collaboration with the Fellowship Committee and show some scary movies. MINISTERIAL SEARCH COMMITTEE UPDATE

Our survey drew an overwhelming response of 86% of our membership and 25 friends. Many thanks to all of you! We'd like to plan a lunch on a Sunday this fall to share the survey results with you, and would be grateful for a volunteer to help coordinate this.
