AUGUST 10 SERVICE  
COPING WITH CHANGE  
AND LOSS**

How we learn to cope with minor losses and changes (little deaths) that occur naturally as part of living directly affects how we cope with our significant losses and changes, leading eventually to the ultimate change and loss — the death of someone close to us or our facing our own. This is not entirely based on religious or spiritual faith or even belief in the afterlife, but focuses on the developmental emotional process we humans go through.

Through music, readings and insight, Ellen will offer a three-step process to help us learn how to acknowledge, prepare for, and accept the changes and losses that are an important and necessary part of the wonderful experience called life. Parents are encouraged to attend with their school age children to this “kid friendly” discussion.

Ellen is an ordained Interfaith minister and certified pastoral counselor. Her ministry for the past eight years is working as a Chaplain and Bereavement Counselor for Neighborhood Hospice of West Chester. She will be available after the service to provide specific information and support.

**BOARD OF TRUSTEES**

The Board of Trustees conducted its regular monthly meeting on July 8. The primary purpose of this summer-time meeting was an orientation of the new members. This included an overview of the Carver model and policy governance in congregations, the four main jobs of policy boards, and a brief discussion of goals. Bob Scott provided handouts of multiple resources to assist the new members in coming up to speed.

The Building committee had brought the issue of window repair before the Board, along with three proposals and estimates. Bruce Koepcke (via email, not present at the meeting) recommended that the windows be tackled one side of the building per year, beginning with the front. He also recommended proceeding with the option that would retain and repaint the original windows, and add storm windows for energy efficiency. After some discussion, the Board unanimously approved the use of funds from the Building Repair Restricted Reserves, up to \$5,000 for this work to begin as soon as possible.

Diane Cohle gave a summary of the Mission Committee's work to date to update the Board on its progress, to seek clarification of what may or may not be included in this process, and to present a preliminary outline of the proposed process. The goal is to engage the congregation in the process of developing our Mission statement, beginning this fall. The board agreed that the committee is on the right track and should continue in the direction it is going, with a process ready to present at the Board retreat in August.

It was unanimously agreed that no monthly Board meeting would be held in August due to the retreat on August 22 and 23.

Current Board members include: Bob Scott, President; Craig Talbot, Vice President; Erach Patel, Executive Treasurer; Eileen Kelly-Meyer, Secretary; and Diane Cohle, Sandy Schaal, Juan Leon and Betty Grosse, Trustees. Rev. Deborah Mero and Pam Baxter, Director of Religious Education, also meet with the Board. Members and friends of the Fellowship are encouraged to share comments and concerns with Board members, as well as to attend Board meetings if interested. Meeting minutes are posted to the members section of the UFWC website after being approved by the Board.

## REmarks – RELIGIOUS EDUCATION UPDATE

### Thoughts About Food

On July 2 Tom Townsend (Social Justice Committee) and I met with Larry Welsch, who heads up the Cares Food Network (formerly Chester County Cares) in West Chester. We got a tour of their food “cupboard” (warehouse) and learned how the system works for providing low-income individuals and families with emergency food.

Tom was looking for ways the adult members of our fellowship can support Cares’ programs. I was looking for ways that the children might get involved. We plan to continue to collaborate on this so that involvement is multi-aged, and we all have a sense of working together as a congregation.

I have been investigating other hunger-related programs that the children can easily participate in, such as freerice.com and thehungersite.com. These will build on programs we already support: the International Heifer Project, Trick-or-Treat for Unicef, and cooking meals for the Safe Harbor homeless shelter. More on this in the September Fellowtarian.

### Food for Thought

*“One of the best things about Unitarian Universalism is that you can believe whatever you want.”* Have you ever heard these words uttered at the Fellowship as an earnest member, friend or student described how wonderful Unitarian Universalism is? Maybe you’ve said something similar yourself. It’s easy to say, and certainly makes UUism sound different, but is it true? Can Unitarian Universalists believe whatever they want? Is there a better way to say what I think is trying to be expressed in that statement?

Ours is such a free and liberal faith, drawing on the wisdom of other religions as well as our own Christian roots, that it’s easy to subscribe to the notion that we have the freedom to believe whatever we want. But while we do not insist that our members profess belief in a particular creed or dogma, we do have Seven Principles that guide us in our spiritual exploration. And here we find a major clue.

Our fourth principle affirms and promotes “A free and responsible search for truth and meaning.” With the words “free and responsible” we are given a paradox to work within: we may be free in our searching, but we must also be responsible. We are free to explore whatever spiritual sources and traditions we wish, but we are bound to exercise responsibility and choose our beliefs carefully, keeping our other principles in mind.

For instance, believing anything we want might put us

squarely in conflict with our first principle, which calls on us to respect the worth and dignity of others, or with our second principle, which encourages us to treat each other fairly, and also our seventh principle, which admonishes us to respect the earth.

So – what’s a possible rewrite of the “we can believe anything” statement? So far, I’ve come up with the following: “UUs can’t believe whatever we want, but we can choose what we want to believe.” It’s not perfect yet, and may never be, but for me it moves UUism from a careless faith to one of deliberate thought.

I offer you this in the hopes that it might spark some summertime family conversation, and that you’ll share your thoughts with me. I’d love to hear your ideas.

## UUA GENERAL ASSEMBLY REPORT

I was privileged to attend the General Assembly of our UUA this past June in Fort Lauderdale, Florida, as a delegate from our Fellowship with Deborah and Ralph Mero. I only regret that more members of our congregation could not attend this year. It was everything General Assembly has always been – exciting, energizing, educational, informative, inspiring, and just plain fun. As with all General Assemblies, it is also impossible to summarize in a brief *Fellowtarian* article.

Instead, what I suggest you do is check out the GA coverage on the UUA website ([uua.org/events/generalassembly/2008/](http://uua.org/events/generalassembly/2008/)). I've been to seven GA's going back to the 1980s and Van Jones, this year's speaker, delivered the best Ware lecture ever. You can read a written account of the lecture or listen to it in Streaming Video. Search for Ware Lecture.

But GA is also about conducting the business of the Association. One item of note this year was a business resolution calling upon the UUA, its congregations and districts to support youth and young adults through a variety of means. The discussion on this resolution was spirited and pointed to a general sense among the youth that they were not thoroughly integrated and supported by the UUA and member congregations. We have a strong youth group in the Fellowship and can be proud of our efforts in that area, but we fall short when it comes to young adults. You can check out the resolution on the UUA website, or ask me for a copy.

Also during the business sessions, the delegates passed a Congregational Study/Action Issue entitled "Ethical Eating: Food and Environmental Justice." Basically, this document calls upon congregations to study the production, distribution and use of food across the world from an ethical and environmental standpoint. As with all "CSAI's," as they are called, it will be the subject of study for the next three years (with workshops on the subject at subsequent GAs) before a possible Statement of Conscience is proposed and adopted four years hence. It is not mandatory that congregations study the issue; see me if you are interested.

## ANOTHER PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION

Unitarian Universalists across the United States will be electing more than the President of their country in the coming year. They will be electing a new President of the Unitarian Universalist Association as well.

The Rev. Laurel Hallman, minister at the First Unitarian Church in Dallas, and The Rev. Peter Morales, minister at Jefferson Unitarian Church in Golden, Colorado, are running to succeed the Rev. Bill Sinkford. The election will take place at next year's General Assembly, June 24-28 in Salt Lake City. The candidates are already campaigning, and they may well make a stop in our own Joseph Priestley District prior to the election. (The Joseph Priestley District, or JPD, encompasses congregations in New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, Washington, D.C. and northern Virginia.) The most likely time for a candidates' visit is at our annual district conference April 24-26 in Wilmington. I'll keep you posted.

Meanwhile, both candidates have interesting biographies, available with other information on their websites (just Google their names). It's important to learn about them even if you don't plan on attending GA. We will most likely be working out a process to get the preference of the congregation so that our delegates to GA have some guidance in casting their votes.

And speaking of the Salt Lake City GA...In addition to voting for a new President, a Commission on Appraisal appointed by the UUA Board will be proposing changes to our Purposes and Principles. Those changes will be subject to a simple majority vote in Salt Lake




## HABITAT FOR HUMANITY

**Progress to Date:** The footers have been poured for the base of the foundation on the house we are co-sponsoring with our other Co-Habitat coalition partners. Once the concrete cures, we will begin assembling the forms for the actual foundation walls within the next few weeks. In the meantime we have been helping complete the first three houses on Worthington Street which are planned to be done this summer. With any luck, "our" house will be above ground level by our next UFWC work week in September, and we'll be in the exciting phase of more rapid visible progress.

**Volunteers Needed:** Our next UFWC volunteer week is September 11-13. There are many ways you can contribute besides heavy manual labor. We need the following:

- Work crew volunteers for any part of Thursday, 9/11, Friday 9/12, or Saturday 9/13 from 8:30 a.m. - 3:30 p.m. Just one day or even a half day is fine. Both skilled and unskilled labor is needed.
- Donate lunch for the work crew (food for 8-10 people). You can serve it too, or just buy the food – whatever you can do is okay and is helpful.
- Serve lunch to the crew on one of those days, around 11:45 a.m. This is a fun way to help out the team, and will really be appreciated.
- Donate a T-shirt (\$15) for a member of the work crew. We'd like to have our crew identifiable with "Co-Habitat" T-shirts that say "UFWC" and even personalized with the crew member's name (avoiding the need for duct-tape name tags).
- Not available for the UFWC week in September, but still want to help out? Volunteer to work with our other Co-Habitat partners by joining their work crews on other weeks. ## FOOD BANK DONATIONS NEEDED

*The Philadelphia Inquirer* has had several articles about the shortage of food at area food banks this summer. In summer children can't receive free or low cost food at school, and food bank donations are seasonally lower. This year the bad economy and other stresses are causing more families than normal to seek help from food banks.

UFWC has a way for you to help. Put a check or cash in the Food Bank Donation Box at the grocery card table on Sunday morning. Donations may also be mailed to the Fellowship. Make checks payable to UFWC and write food bank in the memo line. Donations are tax deductible.

We convert the donations into grocery cards and send them to Catholic Social Services in West Chester. This food bank was selected by the Social Justice Committee in spring of 2003. They appreciate grocery cards since fresh produce, milk, etc. are not stored at the food bank.

We will use your donations to send extra needed batches of grocery cards to the food bank during the summer.
