

The Song of Deborah

Where has the summer gone? It seems like it was just last week that a bunch of us were ascending the many escalators and staircases to the top level of the stands to watch the Phillies play the Angels last June. A lot has happened since then, but mostly it was a break from the fast paced and full year of packing, moving, acclimating, and getting settled in to a new area, a new congregation and a new routine. And now, it's time to get back in gear and move forward.

Ralph and I attended GA as did Flo Miller. We all tended to find our way to different activities, workshops and events and will share what we gleaned with you over time. One of the presentations I went to was done by what the UUA calls a "breakthrough" congregation, one that has grown rapidly in a short period of time. In truth, it is a myth that growth happens in a short period of time because much of the growth takes place after some solid preparation work.

In any case, looking at the "story outline" prepared by this particular congregation, the first item on it is "*Occupying Holy Ground*," which is explained by the question, "where in the world is... (this church)?" and the statement "Transformation—setting free the ministry in you." What they mean by those statements is that the first step is questioning where they are—given who they are and where they are, what is their calling to ministry in their particular location? How are they to be a force for transformation

both as a congregation in their community and as individuals in the congregation? What justifies their presence on or being a site for Holy Ground? In a word, what is their mission?

That a breakthrough congregation put mission first on their list is no surprise to me, nor is it to the leadership of the UFWC. It is a question/conversation we have been having periodically throughout my first year with you. I am excited that we will be embarking on a process to determine our mission with the participation of the entire congregation in the next

couple of months. There is a fabulous task force that has been working through the summer to design the process that we shall be using, and it will be invigorating to bring everyone into the conversation to discover in concrete terms what it is that we are about together. It will be an exciting opportunity to include the thoughts

and ideas of so many new members into the fabric of the congregation in such a meaningful way. You will be hearing more about this from me and others as we gear up and charge ahead. Your questions will be answered and your input sought.

As we determine our collective mission, there will be ample opportunity for each of us to examine our own understanding of our personal mission, our reason for being in this complex world in which we find ourselves living and working, our calling in life. I hope that the experience will be a renewing and rejuvenating one for many of you.

So we begin the year with some stimulating and meaningful work ahead of us. I can think of no better way to start and no better group of people with which to do it. In a world where there is so much fear and doubt, let us build our foundation on love and enter into commitment to overcome those fears and doubts and reach out to help others do the same.

FROM THE PRESIDENT -- HAPPY NEW YEAR!

Hmm, what's he talking about? Well even though the Unitarian Fellowship of West Chester works on a fiscal year from July to June, many of us feel that our true church year starts in September. Summer is a time for re-grouping, for reflecting on the past year, for getting ready for the next year.

It also is increasingly a time for many very interesting services, although my own summer schedule prevents me from attending as often as I'd like. This

improvement is part of our changing and growing community. Strong summer programs are now part of our culture, and I invite everyone who lays low in summer to come on out more often.

We on the Board and many others in the Fellowship are gearing up for a new year. We'll be having a Board retreat to come together as a group with three new members and to establish our working relationships and our goals and timelines for the year. Other committees are similarly getting themselves ready for the busy times ahead. The calendar for the fall is already pretty full. I always look forward to getting back to the increased activity, although I'm always sad to see summer go.

One activity in particular that's gearing up for the fall has me pretty excited – we're going to work as a congregation on discussing and agreeing on a mission statement for UFWC. Some will wonder why

I find this exciting. Haven't we done this already? Don't we have a great vision statement (Yes!). Why do we need to do this now?

One of the most rewarding aspects of this Fellowship for me is when we get together and have good long conversations with each other about where we're going next. We did this as part of our decision to get on a growth path a few years ago. We did it as part of our long range plan discussions.

We did it when we agreed on that great vision statement that describes who we are to the rest of the world so elegantly. We did it when we worked with Tom Chulak in our growth consultancy. And we did it as we described ourselves to the search committee and to prospective ministers.

I believe that our Fellowship is quite dynamic in its membership and activities and that a regular deep reflection and sharing of views about who we are and where we're going is crucial to the health of our congregation. We need to honor and include the views of our many new members and to combine them with the traditions and views we have long shared in shaping our direction forward. The Board in particular, acting as a representative

for the entire congregation, needs this input as we do our work.

Mission is also important at this time because it forces us to answer the hard questions of purpose and benefit. Why exactly are we gathered as a congregation? What benefit comes from our existence? What are we trying to accomplish, and for whom and how much are we willing to give of ourselves to get it done? And of course, given that we are limited in resources, this forces us to make priority decisions. This mainly means that we need to decide what to focus on and what to let go (the very hardest thing in many cases).

I encourage everyone to take some time as summer winds down to do some soul searching along these lines and to be an active participant in this work as the mission committee announces its plans. The Board will use the outcome to craft our Ends statements under policy governance, and the Minister and all the committees will use this mission in setting our collective goals and measuring how we're doing against them. And the world will benefit all the more from our existence!

Sort of like New Year's resolutions that we help each other keep! Happy New Year and I look forward to seeing everyone back at the Fellowship.



WE’RE ON A MISSION. BUT WHAT IS IT?

We have a *vision* of where we want to be as a congregation in the next few years. Our vision statement is posted in the lobby, on our website, and is repeated at every service.

In contrast, a *mission* is a statement of what we should be *doing*. Our congregation exists to serve our mission, according to UUA guidance. A clear mission statement will maintain our focus as we choose our pathway. It will be the touchstone against which we determine if we are achieving what we should.

So what is our mission? This fall we will choose one sentence that states our mission. To arrive at a mission statement, we will be considering: Whose lives do we intend to change and in what way? What can we change within ourselves? Among ourselves? Beyond ourselves? What difference can UFWC make? The mission is to change the lives not only of our members, but of others as well, so we must look beyond our doors.

Our mission will be the touchstone against which we determine if we are achieving what we should.

This fall, a committee of UFWC members and Rev. Mero will be prompting your thoughts about our mission through sermons, articles, posters, announcements and small group meetings, then will use all of your input to draft a mission statement for review and approval.

The UUA has provided invaluable background for this project, including a characterization of key features of a mission statement: It should address *ends*, not means, *results* not “righteous effort.” This means avoiding language such as try, seek, influence, encourage. The mission statement should avoid reference to something that will be ongoing and instead focus on outcome. It should state what difference UFWC will make for its beneficiaries, not just describe what we will be doing. Finally, and this is critical: BREVITY! A rambling, lengthy statement will bury the main point or obscure the fact that there isn’t a central, compelling focus.

Progress to date: The foundation of our house is poured, and the walls are going up. We have been working on the other three homes as well as ours, so we have a real community effort going on with the work force at the Habitat site.

Habitat for Humanity Volunteers Needed: Our next UFWC volunteer week is September 11-13. There are many ways you can contribute besides heavy manual labor. We need the following:

- Work crew volunteers for any part of Thursday, Friday, or Saturday, September 11 through 13, from 8:30 a.m. - 3:30 p.m. Just one day or even a half day is fine. Both skilled and unskilled labor is needed.
- Donate lunch for the work crew (food for 8-10 people). You can serve it too, or just buy the food – whatever you can do is okay and is helpful.
- Serve lunch to the crew on one of those days, around 11:45 a.m. This is a fun way to help out the team and will really be appreciated.
- Donate a T-shirt (\$15) for a member of the work crew. We'd like to have our crew identifiable with "Co-Habitat" T-shirts that say "UFWC" and even personalized with the crew member's name (avoiding the need for duct-tape name tags).



Not available for the UFWC week in September, but still want to help out? Volunteer to work with our other Co-Habitat partners by joining their work crews on other weeks. Let us know what days (any Wed/Thu/Fri/Sat) this summer you are available, especially on short notice, and we'll be prepared to help backfill our partners' work crews when they come up short. This is a wonderful way to foster closer relationships with new friends in our partner churches/schools while working along side them.

As our gleaning project picks up momentum, let's not forget the professional growers, the farmers whose living is determined by the produce they sell. That's what "Fair Trade" is all about—paying a fair, sustainable wage to the farmers. So please take home coffee, tea, and chocolate from the lobby. You'll like it doubly because it tastes good and you will have helped a family to achieve a better existence.

Just look for the small display case on the stairs going up to the office. It's self-serve. Before or after the service, take what you need and leave the money in the envelope. It's that simple.

GLOBAL WARMING

Global Warming Watch. According to the Union of Concerned Scientists, "We are now observing real changes due to higher temperatures. Here are some examples: 1) The Mt. Kilimanjaro glacier, which has survived the past 11,000 years, is currently at risk of disappearing by 2020 if present rates of melting continue; 2) Enormous tracts of Siberian peatlands are beginning to thaw and release carbon dioxide and methane into the atmosphere."

GW group's Tip of the Month: Trees absorb carbon dioxide, a global warming gas, and produce oxygen, necessary for our survival. Fall is an excellent time to plant trees.
