

## THE SONG OF DEBORAH

We talked a lot about mission in the last newsletter that came your way — several of us had a lot to say about it. We're talking about mission in Board meetings and Council meetings and generally all over the place. But it is important that we not leave out the other part of the process we are about to embark on, namely "covenant."

While we know that having a clear concise mission statement will help drive the direction that the UFWC wants to take as it grows, the one thing we don't want to forget along the way is that as significant as the mission is and will be, we are part of a covenanted community.

How we do our work together is as important as the work itself. Though it might seem that trying to draft both statements in one process is too much to take on, the two really go hand in hand. Just the fact that the entire community is being invited into the process is a reflection of the implicit covenant we already honor — that of inclusion. We want every voice to be listened to because it is the larger vision of a shared ministry that brings us together.

The other understanding that is implied by covenant is that it assumes you will want to be part of the process. Not only do we need you to participate, your desire to get involved is a reflection of your commitment to the covenant. Everything we wish to accomplish rests on that

idea that we are in this together. Rejoice and be glad in it! Please plan to add your voice to the process.

Now to change the subject. October is about to be upon us. The post game season of baseball is barreling its way towards us. As of this moment, there are at least two teams that are being watched assiduously. Most of you are watching the

Phillies with baited breath.



## FROM THE PRESIDENT

As I mentioned in the August *Fellowtarian*, the new Board was getting ready for a new year by holding a retreat in late August to set our expectations for each other as a group and to set goals for ourselves and the Fellowship as a whole for the upcoming year.

Well, we had that retreat, and I want to say (again) that I'm very honored to be part of this fellowship and to be able to work with this fine team. You should all feel very lucky to have them at work – I do for sure!

We had a great facilitator, Jody Malloy, who is part of the JPD adjunct staff helping with such events. Jody is past president of the UU Church of Delaware County in Media, a group that called a minister the year before we called Rev. Mero, and who last year went through the formal adoption of Policy Governance. Jody was a perfect fit for us.

We spent Friday evening at the Cohles getting to know each other and talking about how we'll work with each other and behave with each other, a Board covenant in essence, that we documented and will formalize into our Board Policies, one of the four areas of Policy Governance that we will work on this year. It's nice to have gotten so far on that part.

Early Saturday morning, we convened at the wonderful facilities and grounds at Main Line UU Church available to us for the day. (Thanks Main Line!) The first thing we did was to vote as a Board to formally adopt Policy Gover-

nance as our model. We've been working toward this end for a few years time, but we felt it was time to make that commitment for the record and then to plan on getting it done.

Then we spent the day breaking that plan down into its multiple smaller parts, assigned ourselves to smaller sub groups to go research each of these parts, and come back to the Board with drafts of policies and recommendations for discussions. We have a time line that calls for us to get all of our PG areas completed this year and adopted by the congregation (with appropriate by-laws changes as needed) at our June congregational meeting.

Everyone on the Board is part of several of these sub-teams, and we're all excited about getting our policies out on the table and documented this year. I don't want to go into an explanation of policy governance in this article, but I can point anyone interested to materials, and we'll be putting our own progress up on the

web site soon. But what I want to say is that your Board is energized to get this work done this year and make life easier for all leadership going forward so we can concentrate on the work of fulfilling our mission.

Speaking of which, the Board realizes our most important work is to clearly define our Ends policies, and these are driven as more specific examples of our mission. Hence the work on Ends by the Board will wait until the mission is adopted by the congregation – a process for which participation by everyone, old and new, is important this fall.

If anyone is interested in more details of our time line or our work as we progress, feel free to contact any Board member or myself, or check the Board minutes online for our progress. It will be a lot of work this year, but I'm excited by the enthusiasm and teamwork evident and look very much forward to this rewarding effort.

Parents are great resources for other parents, but parents are also busier than ever, and what we hear is that there isn’t enough time to talk to each other on Sunday mornings or at Fellowship social events. An idea that the RE Committee is investigating is setting up an online discussion forum where parents and guardians can post questions, and share experiences and insights, ranging from the spiritual development of children to strategies for getting everyone out the door to church on Sunday mornings.

Apparently, whenever one of the other kids asked a question, our girls said, ‘We have a book about that,’ or, ‘At our other church we learned...’ It’s nice to know they have been paying attention!”

## CANDLES OF CARING AND SHARING

For many of us, the lighting of candles as we share our Joys and Concerns is a valued part of Sunday morning worship. This ritual gives us the opportunity to express what is uppermost in our personal lives and to hear how the lives of our friends and fellow congregants are currently unfolding. By this practice we demonstrate that we do aspire to be a caring congregation.

Visitors to our church may get a different impression, however. On hearing the details of unknown peoples' lives (and frequently the people mentioned are neither present nor members of the church) visitors may feel like they have intruded into a closed circle of intimates. This is not our intent.

In order for the Candles of Caring and Sharing to function well, we need to follow some guidelines. Sharing personal and family news of deep importance such as births, weddings, new jobs, deaths and seriousness illness is appropriate, as is sharing whatever else has mightily raised your spirits or laid you low. Announcements of church business or statements of a political or philosophical nature are not appropriate within this ritual.

## BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Board of Trustees conducted its regular monthly meeting on September 9. The primary focus of this meeting was continuing the work started at the Board Retreat in August, defining our next steps toward fully implementing Policy Governance. The Board members formed a number of sub-groups to delve into specific areas of policy governance and how they might work at UFWC. These groups are working within a time line we created to bring research and recommendations back to the full board for discussion and decision as this year progresses. Throughout the year, you will be hearing much more about changes related to Policy Governance, and our goal is to put these together in a full recommendation to the congregation at our annual meeting.

An important first step is defining our Mission and Covenant, upon which all we do will be based. Put very simply, Mission is our reason for being, and Covenant is how we will be together. This process is beginning very soon, with an introductory service on September 21 followed by meetings, small and large, in which all will have an opportunity to participate and be heard. See the Mission committee article elsewhere in this newsletter for more details. Watch for more information on the Mission/Covenant process in the coming weeks and please plan to participate.

The Board formally appointed Mark Steel as "Program Coordinator", a position created by Congregational vote in June. His primary duties are to co-chair the Fellowship Council and act as liaison between the Council and the Board.

Another major topic of this meeting was the re-forming of the Committee on Ministry (COM), which serves to monitor the health of our shared ministry. Our Bylaws dictate that this Board committee is to be jointly appointed by the Board and the Minister, but last year the COM was comprised of former Search committee members, as a transitional committee. The Board and Deborah will begin this month to nominate members for the new COM.

Current Board members include: Bob Scott, President; Craig Talbot, Vice President; Erach Patel, Executive Treasurer; Eileen Kelly-Meyer, Secretary; and Diane Cohle, Sandy Schaal, Juan Leon and Betty Grosse, Trustees. Rev. Deborah Mero, Pam Baxter, Director of Religious Education, and Mark Steel, Program Coordinator, also meet with the Board. Members and friends of the Fellowship are encouraged to share comments and concerns with Board members, as well as to attend Board meetings if interested. The Board meets on the second Tuesday of the month, in the office. Meeting minutes are posted to the members section of the UFWC website after being approved by the Board.

## MISSION ~~IM~~POSSIBLE

Do you know the UFWC does not have a mission statement or a covenant statement? The goal is to have a mission and covenant statement adopted by the congregation at a congregational meeting by February. A mission statement defines why we exist and gives the Board direction in governing. It also provides a yardstick with which we can measure how we are doing on all the ministries of the congregation. A covenant statement describes how we will be in relation to each other, how we will be in relation to the congregation, and how we will be in relation to the mission.

During the month of October and into early November, please attend one of the 14 neighborhood meetings being planned to give your input into the mission-covenant statement. The Mission-Covenant Committee has helped organized these neighborhood groups based on where you live. It is also an opportunity to get to know those in the Fellowship who live close to you for carpooling, lending a helping hand, etc. A host from your neighborhood will be calling you to invite you to his/her house to participate in a two-hour meeting. A member of the Mission-Covenant Committee will facilitate the discussion.

Based on your thoughts and ideas given at these meetings, the Mission-Covenant Committee will formulate the mission statement for the UFWC. Representatives from the neighborhood groups will also be asked to participate in these final phases of drafting the mission-covenant statement. In December, we will publicize the draft statement and ask you if we have captured the spirit of UFWC as expressed through the neighborhood meetings. A town meeting will be held in early January to review the statement that will then be publicized during the remainder of the month.
