Last May, a large contingent of our high school seniors graduated, an event we celebrated in a special Bridging Service. At this service, we will interview these returning graduates to learn where life's journeys have taken them. Two years ago, the service title was the answer to the following major life question: "What was the most interesting meal you have prepared for yourself since graduating from high school?" REmarks – RELIGIOUS EDUCATION UPDATE

If you grew up in a faith tradition, what do you remember? Did you go to Sunday school classes? Attend Catechism? Take Hebrew lessons? What are the things that stick in your mind? The fragrance of incense during mass? A particular hymn or prayer? Singing in the choir?

Lifelong Unitarian Universalists have their own memories. In her book, “Full Circle,” “lifer” Kate Erslev lists what people shared during her research of people who grew up UU. The most mentioned positive memories were Sunday RE classes, a sense of belonging and friends, Choir/Singing, Holiday Pageants, and Family Camping. Other positive memories included Bible Stories, Youth Worship, Church Suppers/Potlucks, Science and Nature Activities, Exploring the Building, and Social Action Projects.

When RE Committee members recently shared what their children enjoy about coming to UFWC, we added a few other things to the lists in the book: lighting the chalice, taking part in skits and pageants, making ornaments, and this spring’s Alice In Wonderland-themed service. Older children cited singing “This Little Light of Mine.” Children also remember passing the flame from candle to candle during our Christmas Eve service and singing Silent Night together.

In asking the “what do you remember” question, events fall into two main categories – events remembered by virtue of repetition and ritual, and individual events of unusual impact. Both are important. The regularity of Sunday RE classes, and the rituals of lighting the chalice and candles of sharing. Revisiting social action projects: Safe Harbor meals; raising money

for the Heifer Project. Our annual Youth Group service, RE Sunday, and the Bridging and Coming of Age Ceremonies. Also important are those deeply experienced one-time events such as summer camping, with the intensity of being together in the same place for a long time, cooking over a fire, sleeping out in nature, inventing games and playing well into the dark, and singing around the campfire. Both the smaller, repeated activities and the larger, one-time events leave enduring positive memories.

As memorable as these events may be, they only take on their deepest meaning and impact in community. And so Erslev suggests that “We need to include more about the life of the community in religious education curricula.” Our children gain much from ritual and repetition, and from larger events; but they also benefit from being with each other and from being in the larger church community. Things impact us differently when we experience them as part of a group.

Looking for fun UU things to do this holiday season? I encourage you to come to our Christmas Eve service. There is an indescribable feeling that comes from us all being together at this special time of year, lighting candles of peace and hope. If you plan to attend a holiday Open House, look for one that is “kid friendly,” and find out if any of your child’s Fellowship friends will also be there.

For something you can do at home, consider adding “Chalica” to your holiday observances. Started two years ago, Chalica is a seven-day event that creates opportunities to live each of our UU Principles. To learn more, go to our website (www.ufwc.org), click on “Religious Education,” and then

click on “Chalica” at the bottom of the RE Download section on the right.”

However you observe it, I wish you a wonderful holiday season and look forward to celebrating with you. And I invite you to ask your children what they remember about their church experiences, and to share what you learn with me.

I want tell you a story about a small but highly memorable episode in my life. We were an Air Force family, always moving. I was the oldest of four children and had moved the most. One school, one friend, one neighborhood after another. I was 13, and I knew another relocation was imminent. My father came to me and asked, "Rick, where do you want to live the next three years – Spain, Germany, or Japan? Tell me tomorrow."

I was a little confused, but the next day, after looking the three countries up in my school library (I also checked with my mom, who liked warm weather), my unequivocal answer was Spain. Two weeks later, my father announced to us that based on advice from me and the needs of the Air Force, we should start packing for Spain. Because he was actually quite convincing, I have never felt as empowered and as much a valued part of my family as I did that day. I truly felt that I had influenced my family's future and had helped my father make an important decision.

Now you have an opportunity similar to mine. After a potluck lunch following the December 6 service, we will hold the first of three "Ends Workshops" (really, "funshops"). By participating, you will help your congregation and Board chart the first phase of our mission-journey toward greater spiritual growth and development. When complete, you will feel empowered and know you helped ensure that we all live life more fully.

FINANCIALLY YOURS

It was gratifying to note that UFWC has so far avoided some of the financial turmoil that has afflicted some of our neighboring UU congregations. Income from pledges is on budget (33% for 33% of the fiscal year) and expenses are slightly below budget. Thanks to a large carryover from last year and income from expected and unexpected gifts, our cash position is excellent with two plus months cover for expected expenses.

So far so good, but let's not become complacent. Some one-time expenses are approaching and other expenses like insurance are increasing. Also for the first time in memory, we missed our previous year's pledge income (2008-2009) by more than our planned discount. (We always anticipate that some pledges will not be paid, but more of last year's pledges went unpaid than expected.) The good news is that there is still time for people to complete last year's pledge and get a tax deduction for this year. This also holds true for those who want to reduce 2009 taxes by paying one time gifts and pledges before the end of the year.

Believe it or not, it's already time to start thinking about next year's budget. Getting a jump on this planning will greatly benefit our stewardship efforts now being planned. Committees should start thinking about funds they need to sustain current activities and implement new programs and capabilities.

Thanks again to the members of the Finance and Stewardship Committees for their hours of service. If you have financial inclinations and talents and a few hours a month that you can share, we need you. Please see me or Pam Sapko, and tell us what you'd like to do.


Join us Sunday, December 6, for worship and then, from 12:30 – 6 p.m., a potluck lunch and an afternoon workshop for you.

GLOBAL WARMING LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

The American Clean Energy & Security Act, (HR 2454) narrowly passed the U.S. House in June. The Senate companion bill, Clean Energy Jobs and American Power Act (S.1733), was passed by the Senate Environment and Public Works Committee on Nov. 5. Arlen Specter, a committee member, voted yes. The bill will be sent to the full Senate after input from the Energy and Natural Resources Committee and Agriculture, Commerce, Finance and Foreign Relations panels.

Both bills were designed to "create clean energy jobs, promote energy independence, reduce global warming pollution, and transition to a clean energy economy." For more information, go to <http://kerry.senate.gov>.

To support this legislation, thank Senator Specter for his committee vote and ask Senator Casey to support the final bill (www.senate.gov).

FIRST SUNDAY FOOD COLLECTION

Canned meats are the suggested donation to the West Chester Food Cupboard for December.

Our monthly food collection is Sunday, December 6. Look for baskets in the lobby.

UFWC belongs to the Circle of Giving for the West Chester Food Cupboard. This is a group of organizations who rotate which food items they will collect each month in order to keep the food bank shelves stocked with the items that are most needed.

Our suggested items for the next few months are: January – canned fruit, February – personal care (diapers, toilet paper, paper towels, tissues), March – peanut butter and jelly. Of course, donations of non-perishable items that are not in our category for the month will also be gladly accepted.

Please check the expiration dates of anything you donate. (Expired items must be thrown away.)

The volunteers who run the food cupboard are very appreciative of all the help from UFWC - volunteers, food donations, and gift cards. Thank you.



Global Warming Tip of the Month: The greenest energy is the energy that was never produced! The consulting firm, McKinsey & Co., estimated that 40% of the pollution reduction needed to prevent catastrophic global warming can be achieved through efficiency improvements alone (*NY Times*, November 29, 2006).

Households can improve their energy efficiency by using fluorescent bulbs, weather stripping, EnergyStar-rated appliances, buying locally produced food, shopping with re-usable bags, lowering the thermostat and driving slower on properly inflated tires.

Located at 206 North Church Street in West Chester, the organization provides short-term housing for six mothers and their children who would otherwise be homeless.

UUSC UPDATE

UUS CHOOSE JUSTICE THROUGH “FAIR TRADE”

UUSC cooperates with Equal Exchange, the originators of the “Fair Trade” concept. Since the “Fair Trade” project was launched in 2001, hundreds of UU congregations have made the initiative a huge success — representing the highest participation rate of any denomination in Equal Exchange’s Interfaith Program. In 2008 alone, UUs purchased 45.3 tons of fairly traded products; since 2001, well over 250 tons. So please buy some coffee, tea, cocoa, and chocolate bars today at the Fellowship for yourself and for gifts.



Of course, we are selling UUSC Holiday cards again this year and at a reduced price — just \$10 for packages of 10 cards. There are six designs; two of them are new, and no “square” cards that require extra postage.

And speaking of participation rate, because UFWC has been *one of the top 10 congregations* in the U.S. in Holiday card sales, UUSC has chosen us to offer you a “Holiday Bazaar”, a chance to purchase hand-made gift baskets (in 3 sizes) filled with “Fair Trade” coffees, teas, and chocolates; UUSC baseball caps; UUSC aluminum water bottles; hand-made scarves from India; “Home for the Holidays”—a share of an ox and plow to give to Kenyans, and more.
