Thanks to all that have offered kind and supportive words to me. It is an honor to serve as president of the Board of Trustees. We met together as a new board once in early July. Here is a quick overview.

- 1. We have already started our process to pair volunteers with leadership positions. Pam Sapko has graciously agreed to complete the Nominating Committee and will be working with Jon McCormick and Diane Cohle. Hugh Sutherland has accepted the position of Vice-President of the Board of Trustees. We have begun the process to fill the vacancy on the Committee on Ministry.
- 2. We have begun exploring the Interim Ministry Process. For those that would like more information, the UUA website has a <u>Transitional Ministry Handbook</u> (Word format).
- 3. The board and executive team are planning a Policy Governance Tutorial on Tuesday, July 23, at 6:30 p.m. at UCWC. Feel free to join us.

This is a discussion about how to use this form of congregational governance, not whether to use it. Several years ago, the congregation voted in an annual meeting to adopt Policy Governance. We want to be more effective working together, so learning about the process is important. All members of the congregation are welcome.

4. We have started discussing the Ministerial Search Process.

REMARKS—RELIGIOUS EDUCATION UPDATE

Did you see this in the news last month? A family in the Encinitas school district (San Diego, CA area) asked that yoga be removed from the physical education program. Actually, they sued the district, arguing that making yoga part of P.E. violated the First Amendment separation of church and state.

Really? In the West, yoga is practiced mainly for its health benefits: promoting strength, flexibility and balance, as well as reducing stress. In teaching yoga at school, no one is trying to convert children to Hinduism, any more than owners of Indian restaurants are trying to convert their patrons.

I can only assume that the actions of this family come out of fear. And that the fear comes out of ignorance. If they knew what yoga is—if the parents had, for instance, ever taken a yoga class themselves—would they have the same attitude?

Playing rugby doesn't make you British, nor does playing baseball make you American. Being vegetarian doesn't make one a Buddhist or Hindu, any more than smoking tobacco makes one a Native American. Why pick on yoga?

The good news is that the family lost its suit. On July 1, the judge in the case ruled that—the way that it's taught in the schools—yoga is secular. In Encinitas, to make sure that there was absolutely no confusion, they even went so far as to rename the lotus position the "criss-cross applesauce" pose. In addition, children may opt out of the program.

A GIFT THAT COMES BACK TO YOU

You may be waiting and hoping to be asked to volunteer to teach a children's religious education (RE) class. We might not think to ask you. If you have been thinking that you would like to teach in RE or help out in a class, please contact Pam Baxter at email: DRE.

We provide the curriculum to teach from. Also we create teaching teams and schedules, so that each teacher is "on" just 6-8 Sundays a year; plenty of time for you to enjoy the upstairs services the rest of the time.

Teaching is a great way to give to UCWC, and you also get a lot back: learning more about Unitarian Universalism, making deeper connections with the others on your teaching team, and being inspired by the children—their surprising wisdom, their deep questions, and fresh insights.

One thing to be aware of—we never like to say "no" to volunteers, but in any given year, we may not have enough spots to accommodate everyone who wants to teach.

The family's belief and fear may seem ridiculous to Unitarian Universalists. It also points to the value of our Neighboring Faiths curriculum for 7th/8th graders. When we give our young people the opportunity to learn about other faiths, to observe others' rituals and to talk about what they've witnessed and learned, we help make them good cultural citizens. We help prevent misunderstandings based on ignorance, and actions based on fear and distrust.

It's appropriate to wait until children are in middle school to focus on other faiths this way—after they've been grounded in Unitarian Universalism. But we have always used stories from other faiths to enhance the teaching and expression of important qualities such as compassion and forgiveness.

And, thanks to some creative independent UU curriculum writers, we now can offer programs like "<u>Picturebook World Religions.</u>" With the focus each week on a carefully chosen storybook, this curriculum offers a window onto different faiths in a way that children can easily understand; what it's like to be a Muslim, Hindu, or Buddhist. And through this, we find that there are universal ideas and concepts that connect us all.

and celebration of diversity to their own communities and throughout the world. It is their belief that true peace cannot be achieved without mutual understanding, justice and interfaith dialogue.



Forest and the New Man by Senel Paz.



NATIONAL DAY OF ACTION TO RAISE THE MINIMUM WAGE

First, <u>spread the word about the July 24 day of action</u>. Then, on July 24, call your Congressman and Senator and tell them now is the time to raise the full time minimum wage.

It is morally unacceptable that millions of full-time workers in this country cannot feed their families and meet other basic needs. The minimum wage should be a living wage. The federal minimum wage is \$7.25 per hour. The federal minimum for tipped workers is \$2.13 per hour, and it hasn't been raised since 1991.

This action is supported by **UUSC**, the **UUA**, and **UUPLAN**.
