

NOTES FROM REV. DAN 🕫 🕫

Many years ago, my father, in a moment of mixed kindness and smart-aleckyness,

described me as "a *mensch*, and a *schnorrer* by necessity."

Perhaps this takes some explanation. A *mensch*, in Yiddish, is a good individual, a righteous person. Coming from my father, this was praise indeed. A *schnorrer*, on the other hand, is a beggar – not

such a high compliment. I don't know whether my father's comment referred to my precarious financial position at the time or my then new career as a Unitarian Universalist minister. It was, after all, stewardship season.

Over the years I've

struggled with that. I don't want to be a schnorrer, always begging for money, and I don't want the congregation I serve to feel like that either. Good stewardship isn't a matter of begging, just as it isn't about paying for what we get.

To practice stewardship is to tend to something we care deeply about, and that's what we do when we make our annual pledge. Each of us gives according to our abilities. We pledge generously because we want this community to be strong, growing, and vibrant. We want Unitarian Universalism to mean something in West Chester and beyond.

Begging appeals to guilt and pity and carries a tone of judgment.

Good stewardship is a celebration, a motivation to give, because in doing so we help to build a community that transforms lives and a legacy that will continue to do so long after we are gone.

If we all come together to practice that kind of stewardship, begging won't be necessary. We shouldn't have trouble meeting our budget and more. Yes, our giving needs to increase, because we are growing into our mortgage and expenses. Yes, it will

Yes, there are some among us who are struggling, or who don't have as much to give, which places a greater obligation on those of us who do have the means — that's how community works. And yes, it's what we know we want

to do, because our congregation is worth tending.

I'm looking forward to seeing you at our Harvest the Power dinner on March 2 with the whole family – especially if you've never been to one before. Our stewardship dinners and services definitely emphasize joy and celebration.

And I thank you in advance for your pledge this year. It means a great deal to work with so many people who care so deeply for such a wonderful congregation.

I would even say that, as congregations go, this one is a true mensch.

From the President Welcoming Community

When you welcomed me twenty-nine years ago, I was new to the area and pregnant with our first child. I wasn't sure what I wanted from you, except a place for my child to grow up in a liberal religious community. I signed the membership book the first day to get on the mailing list, and a year later, I think I pledged \$100 a year.

As the years went by, I brought my kids to RE, volunteered in RE, and attended services once a month or so. I didn't attend town halls; never spoke to a Board member, never joined a



committee. When life got crazy, and I was getting a divorce, I was desperate for emotional and spiritual support in any form. I lit candles for hope, cried at some of the Hymns, and often rushed out after the kids grabbed a donut, so we could get back to laundry and bills and homework.

But you all were there for us. You included my kids, you counseled me through the tears, and you saw a strength that I didn't know I had. I decided that \$10 a week was well worth what I was getting from this congregation, and since I had no time, that was all I could do.

Fast forward 15 years. I've giggled at Women's Retreats, hosted Poker Nights, eaten at dozens of potlucks, and signed all kinds of important contracts on behalf of our organization. I've been Treasurer and Board President. My life and my identity is deeply connected to our UU community.

My time, my talents and my treasures are freely given back to UCWC because of all that you have done for us. You created a safe space for my kids to be themselves. You welcomed my husband and his lighthearted jokes. You trusted my leadership, expanded my vision for myself, and taught me about the richness of our faith. My pledge to the stewardship campaign has increased tenfold, and still I can't do enough to thank you for welcoming me all those years ago.

REmarks Religious Education Update Creating Agents for Change

If you grew up during the peak of the Cold War (roughly 1962-1979) you probably remember the flurry of spy-type TV shows that emerged during that time: *The Man from U.N.C.L.E., Get Smart,* and *Mission Impossible*. From the U.K. came *The Avengers* and *Secret Agent*. Twenty-six James Bond movies and Six Mission Impossible movies

 with no end in sight – are proof that the world of spies, secret agents, and international intrigue continues to captivate us.

Tapping into that mystique, UCWC members and educators Deanna Gabe and Sarah Hyson have teamed up to create a new curriculum tailor-made for our



3rd-6th graders. During the 13 weeks of "Agents of Change," these students — as secret agents — will work to effect meaningful change in our area.

Before choosing and embarking on a project, the students will create code names for themselves, a secret classroom passcode, and be issued their "passports." Once the groundwork is laid, they'll explore the circles of community – from their own neighborhoods to local townships and boroughs – see where the circles overlap, and investigate the needs of these communities. Students will discuss what service is already being done regarding the issue they choose. They'll identify their backup/potential partners, and determine if they can actually work with them, then formulate a plan for meaningful and effective service. They will have five weeks to work on their project.

Just as real secret agents work under-cover, students will learn that in working for good, being a secret agent means that service is not necessarily done for recognition, but for making the world a better place.

Thanks to Deanna and Sarah for envisioning this program and bringing it to life. We have such wonderfully creative and kind-hearted children in our congregation; I'm looking forward to seeing what project the class selects and the actions they take as Agents for Change.

Thanks to All Our New Chalice Lighters

Our recent campaign to increase the number of Chalice Lighters from UCWC yielded 29 new sign-ups from individuals and couples. That more than doubles our prior representation of 21 in this valuable program.

If you missed the campaign and are unfamiliar with the program, it provides financial assistance to congregations engaged in activities that foster growth. It is administered through the Central East Region (CER) of the Unitarian Universalist Association, which covers a geographical area stretching from New York down to Northern Virginia and out to Ohio. Individuals – dubbed "Chalice Lighters" – commit to contribute at least \$20 three times a year when the CER puts out a "call" to fund a grant to a congregation. Couples are asked to contribute \$40.

UCWC received a much needed \$40,000 grant from Chalice Lighters to assist in our recent renovations. We have received other grant monies in the past, most recently to fund a growth project in the mid-2000s.

The campaign may be over, but it's never too late to become a Chalice Lighter. See Flo Miller for additional information or explore the program on your own here. — Flo Miller

Share-the-Plate Generosity

The Social Justice Committee's **Share-the-Plate program** raises money to give to local non-profit organizations which are trying to improve life for Chester County residents.

We are pleased to announce the share-the-plate recipient for March 17 (third Sunday of the month), Volunteer English Program in Chester County. The Volunteer English Program in Chester County helps adults who are immigrants or refugees by providing free English language instruction and lessons on U.S. culture and customs.



Other English Language Learning programs offer classes that are impossible for some students to attend due to conflicts with their work schedules or to lack of transportation. VEP makes its services accessible to anyone who lives or works in Chester County by providing one-to-one instruction at times and places that are mutually

convenient for the tutor and student. VEP recruits volunteers from all walks of life, trains them to be tutors, assesses students' English skills, and matches tutors with students.

Improving English speaking, reading, and writing skills – and understanding of American culture – helps students reach goals such as getting a sustaining job, communicating with health care providers, conversing directly with their child's teachers, becoming a citizen, and participating in society.

Defenders of Democracy

We will also meet with the mayor of West Chester very soon and with Representative Chrissy Houlahan. We hope our resolution will be approved, thereby helping to bring momentum and publicity to the urgent need to make our democracy work better for everyone.

Recognizing the need to fix our broken democracy, DOD will continue to lobby our county government leaders for positive change. Taking cues from the UUPLAN Good Government Group, DOD will lobby for changes to reduce corruption, improve voting participation, and combat dark money in politics. This year's priorities include:

- No-excuse absentee balloting
- Ban of lobbyists gifts to legislators
- Ban gerrymandering through redistricting reform
- Ban dark money in politics
