"I've been a Unitarian Universalist my whole life, but never had a name for it."

I've heard variations on that sentence for pretty much my entire life. "I've always been looking for something like this." "I had no idea a religion like Unitarian Universalism was possible." "I never knew there was a faith that would love somebody like me." Sometimes it feels like Unitarian Universalism must be the best kept secret in religion.

There are obvious reasons for this. We honor diversity, and we're not interested in converting people who are perfectly happy in their own faiths. Other people sometimes have assumptions about religion that don't apply to us at all. Conversations about religion can sometimes feel awkward to begin with, so it's easy for us to assume that other people wouldn't want to hear it.

The truth is there are a great many who have been waiting years to hear about us. Some are looking for a religion where they don't have to leave any part of themselves at the door, where they can explore spiritual truth and practice without having to accept somebody else's creed, where human dignity is valued, and the ethic of love is real.

Some are going through hard times and need a community that offers solace without judgment. Some are families seeking a supportive and open-minded congregation in which to raise their kids. Some are looking for a religious community that can work for justice, help them grow, and celebrate life all at the same time.

I believe Unitarian Universalism is important. I believe we save lives, and I know we make lives better. I believe our message is exactly what the world needs right now, and I think it's time to tell the world about it.

One of the ways we'll be spreading our message this summer is by joining community events like West Chester's "Swingin' Summer Thursdays," community fairs, and other special days. The first "Summer Thursday" is June 6, and we'll be there with a table, some "kindness rocks" for kids of all ages to make, friendly faces, and information about who we are. I hope you'll sign up to help or stop by and join us for a while.

REmarks—Religious Education Update Growing up UU

What we do in UU children's religious education is kind of paradoxical. We try to teach our kids about Unitarian Universalism and how to "live UU." At the same time, we're aware that the very nature of Unitarian Universalism and our Fourth Principle of promoting "A free and responsible search for truth and meaning" means that children can decide which beliefs are right for them—and this includes deciding that they want to be Christian, or Buddhist, or nothing.

This leads to another paradox, since deciding to be non-UU is

completely UU. And since we believe in "deeds, not creeds," does it matter if our kids decide that they're not Unitarian Universalist if they act like they are? My son, for instance, has that Millennial stance of non-attachment to many things even while embracing them. He attends the Unitarian church in his city, but in a somewhat casual, occasional way. I have the satisfaction of knowing that he's UU, even if he doesn't identify as such. Religious affiliation—or not—just isn't



important to him. Yet that church is his home. And that satisfies me. I want to know that our kids are growing up with a sense of their individual, personal spirituality and also have a place where they can feel part of and connected to a faith community. Both those things are important.

So, what did we do this past year to help our children along that path? In our Sunday morning religious education (RE) classes, our curricula centered on exploring aspects of our seven Unitarian Principles. With our youngest children (PreK through second graders) in Spirit Play, our weekly stories focused on respecting each other, offering fair and kind treatment to all, learning with and from each other, growing in spirit and mind, believing in and acting on our ideas, insisting on a peace, freedom, and justice for all, and valuing and taking care of the Earth.

Our "Agents of Change" (third through sixth graders) took steps in learning how to make a difference in the world when it comes to changing existing policy. They selected a cause to work on the need for and benefits of more time spent out-of-doors — then researched the science behind it, created a petition, and made a video summarizing their thoughts. This was a real-life effort and they will be taking petitions to their schools.

Finally, in the Our Whole Lives class, our seventh, eighth, and ninth graders learned the importance of respecting themselves and their intimate partners (our First Principle's call to respecting the inherent worth and dignity of every person) as they look ahead to stepping into deeper relationships. This is such vital grounding for these teens who will soon be young adults.

We'll be celebrating these accomplishments at our annual RE Sunday on June 9. We'll also recognize all our volunteer teachers and facilitators. Please join us.

On May 3, four members of Defenders of Democracy had the pleasure of meeting with Congresswoman, Chrissy Houlahan at her West Chester office. We had the chance to tell her about our congregation, and the goals of Defenders of Democracy in the areas of pro-democracy/anti-corruption principles based upon the Constitution.

We applauded her for her active participation in getting bill HR1 passed in the House, similar to the American Anti-Corruption Act, which provides our blueprint for lobbying our legislators. She is very much committed to these policies.

Rep. Houlahan has helped start a caucus of new House members who come from a military background and want to work in a bipartisan way to get good bills passed. She is very much an advocate for actionable policy and wants to work to help heal the great partisan divide. She now knows that she has an ally in Defenders of Democracy.
