

NOTES FROM REV. DAN AP

What is your answer to "the elevator question?"

I don't mean, "Is it worth taking the

elevator or would it be faster to just go down the stairs?" In our religion, "the elevator question" is very specific: "If

you were in an elevator, going from the sixth floor to the ground floor, and someone asked you, 'What is Unitarian Universalism?' what would you say?"

That this question still terrifies the daylights out of a great many UUs should tell you that it's not as

simple as you might think. What do you say?

Do you talk about beliefs? We don't have a creed. Do you talk about God, in a religion with about equal numbers of theists and non-theists? Do you just talk about community? We know that our congregation isn't just a social club – but it's not easy to explain exactly why we love it so much.

As our congregation reaches into the larger community in new ways, we'll find ourselves facing the elevator question more and more. That's good, because it means people want to know about us. It's a challenge, because we don't all know what to say.

My quick answer is usually along the lines of, "Unitarian Universalism is a way of life that stresses questioning, spiritual growth, integrity, and community, lived in diversity." I only get into the more complicated areas if the elevator doors haven't opened yet.

Not surprisingly, there are as many ways to approach the question as there are UUs. My friend Andrea Lerner tells people, "Our faith is not interested in saving your soul – we're

here to help you unfold the awesome soul you already have."

Author Laila Ibrahim says, "It's a blessing you were born. It matters what you do with your life. What you know about God is a piece of the truth. You do not have to do it alone."

And Rev. Erik Resly say, "Unitarian Universalists have different beliefs but share a common faith. We know that life is holy, that each person is worthy, and that, when we come together to plant the seeds of love, the world blossoms."

What will your approach be? What will you say?

You might include some history, or maybe theology (come to my October 23 "Unitarian Universalist History and Theologies class for a taste of both). You could talk about what you love. You could talk about what is important to you about our congregation. There are countless possibilities. All it takes is a little practice and a willingness to enter the conversation.

So. What is Unitarian Universalism? In faith, Dan

From the President

A recent episode of the public radio show *1-A* featured a guest with the following story:

Sarah Edmonson was an aspiring actress and was finding roles but felt unfulfilled. She'd been raised by firmly-grounded, politically active parents who taught her that it's important to make a difference in the world. She wanted more meaning in life.

At a film festival, she saw a socially-conscious movie that really spoke to her and tapped the yearning she felt. During a chat with the

> filmmaker, he invited her to attend an event with other like-minded people who wanted to do good in the world.

Up to this point, author Sarah Edmonson could have been talking about a path that led her to a UU church.

Instead, the "event" was a five-day training and recruitment session for the notorious Nxivm cult, whose leader was recently convicted of running a sex ring and pyramid scheme. Edmonson was sucked into Nxivm, and it took her twelve years to come to her senses and work her way out.

How different Sarah Edmonson's life might have been if she had found a UU church instead.

Her story is an example of a common phenomenon in our modern life – people are hungry for meaning and a sense of community.

It's possible to find community in many different ways. Local football fans find it in rooting for the Eagles. Sci-fi fans of a certain age find it in venerating all things Star Trek. A few years ago, I found community through being the president of the homeowners association for our twelve-unit townhouse complex.

But a religious community offers something more than just connection with others. Church is more than a social club, more

than a way to enjoy the company of like-minded people. A religious community offers meaning. It offers guidance in dealing with profound questions in life.

At our September Board meeting, we discussed what UCWC means to us. I mentioned how I treasure the eloquent ideals in our unison affirmation:

We gather, aspiring to be a thriving, caring and welcoming community that supports each person's spiritual journey, embraces diversity, challenges us to live responsibly, and is a catalyst for a just and compassionate world.

Those words speak to everything I seek in a moral and ethical community. The first time I joined in saying them, I knew I was home. — Matt Zencey



Being Mortal Book Discussion Series

How do you want to spend your elder years? Will you rely on the medical profession to determine your quality of life? Modern medicine has transformed the dangers of birth, injury, and infectious disease from harrowing

to manageable. But when it comes to the inescapable realities of aging and death, what medicine can do often runs counter to what it should do.

In *Being Mortal*, through eyeopening research and gripping stories of his own patients and family, author Atul Gawande reveals the suffering produced by medicine's neglect of the wishes that people might have beyond mere survival...and how the ultimate



goal should not be a good death but a good life - all the way to the very end. Whether you're an elder yourself or have a parent or other relative who is, this will be compelling reading.

REmarks: Religious Education Update "Aren't You Retired Yet?"

One of the best things for me about Sunday mornings is getting to see all of you. Sometimes there's only time for a quick smile,

but there's still that moment of connection. So, it's been a little disconcerting lately to come face-to-face with some of you and have you look startled. And then I hear you say, "I thought you were retired!"



So that I don't continue to startle people, I want to

take this opportunity to spell out my timeline to retirement. I currently work for UCWC as Director of Lifespan Faith Development at three-quarter time, i.e., thirty hours a week. I will continue in this capacity through December 31. From January 1 through June 30, I will be working quarter time (10 hours a week) and will not be at UCWC every Sunday.

This will give the RE Committee and RE teachers more opportunity to keep things running on their own. It will also help everyone get used to not seeing me on Sunday mornings. And I won't necessarily attend all the meetings that I normally would. Members of the RE Committee may be the ones keeping the congregation up to date on RE doings in the *Fellowtarian*. We're still figuring out how those details will work.

I also want to clarify what my involvement in UCWC will be after I retire. While it's not required either by my contract or by the Professional Guidelines of LREDA (the Liberal Religious Educators Association), it is strongly recommended that a retired religious education professional stay off-site for at least a year and not be involved in RE for at least two years after leaving their position. This is hugely valuable in giving the new DLFD the chance to fully settle into the job and make it his/her own, and also gets congregation members and kids used to there being a new staff person.

This is an exciting time of transition for all of us. It's my goal — along with Rev. Dan and the RE Committee — to make it as seamless and productive as possible.

Hospitality is our congregation's tradition of a fair and equitable division of labor to make our sanctuary and social room feel warm and inviting on Sunday mornings, help services run smoothly, and perhaps most importantly, provide ample caffeine and delicious snacks for our guests and ourselves to

Hospitality is an important part of every Sunday at UCWC and a responsibility that everyone shares.

- All members and friends of UCWC are assigned to one of four hospitality teams, roughly based on geographic residence: East of Eatin', Southies, UUCrew, and Northern Lights. Each group has a communicator who will send out emails to remind the group when it is their turn. Participation is voluntary.
 - If you have no idea what hospitality team you are on and are NOT getting emails about hospitality turns, please contact us at email: hospitality and let us know and we will add you in.
- There are social hours after both services: from 10:15-11:00 am, and from 12:15 pm to 1:00 pm.
- Each Team takes on four weeks of hospitality commitments and the schedule rotates.
- When it's your team's turn, your communicator will reach out by email to request that you sign up for a

role. You can sign up online with a SignUpGenius. com link, or let your communicator know what role you would prefer. Roles needed are: Openers, Coffee Team, Snacks, Ushers, Floaters for Between Service Help, Coffee Clean Up, and Closers.

 Each role on SignUpGenius now has a little description, so you'll know what to expect when you sign up. Please note that these have been streamlined and simplified.

> • When you arrive at UCWC to do your hospitality tasks, you will find a laminated card in an envelope in the hospitality binder in the kitchen with updated information about the tasks for each role. Please take this card with you as you perform your

tasks — and return it to the binder at the end of your shift.

 If you have any questions or problems, ask other members on your team — it's a group effort, and everyone pitches in.

We thank you for your help. Hospitality is an important part of every Sunday at UCWC and a responsibility that everyone shares. In the upcoming months we will revamp our communication strategy, so that we reach everyone who can help in the most effective way. Gun Violence Prevention

After a bloody summer of so many mass shootings, and with school kids having to do active shooter drills, gun violence has become one of the top issues to American voters. We may be closer to a tipping point than at any time since the Brady bill was passed in 1993 – and you can help.



UUPLAN's gun violence prevention team has identified two areas of focus this year. You can help by calling these legislators:

Congress – Universal Background Checks.

The House has passed a Universal Background Check bill. Call Senator Toomey. Thank him for supporting background checks and ask him to cosponsor Senate Bill S42. (202-224-4254 – You can leave a message. Every phone call is counted.)

Harrisburg – ERPO (Extreme Risk Protection Order). This would take guns out of the hands of anyone who is shown to be a danger to themselves or to others. Please call Senator Lisa Baker, who heads the Senate Judiciary Committee, and ask her to bring bill SB90 up for a vote. (717-787-7428)

Immigration Study Group
