ARE WE TOO "WEIRD"? Nov 17 Rev. Dr. Kate Rohde. 9:15 and 11:00 WHY UU's AND **Minister Emerita OTHER LIBERALS ARE** HARD TO UNDERSTAND

One of the foremost social scientists working on the social psychology of values discovered that people who are more traditionally progressive and those who are more traditionally conservative have two major values in common, but conservatives have additional values that compete with the two that progressives value. In our country this progressive value set is held primarily by people who are Western, educated, rich or financially comfortable, and in democracies. He gives these people the acronym WEIRD both because it fits the letters of the traits involved, but also because this group in the US and even more so around the world is a small, unusual, group. He found that a group of UU's he tested were overwhelmingly WEIRD. What does that mean for UU's? Is our failure to diversify our values part of the reason we are small and less diverse as a church? Should we change, or should we stay WEIRD?

There will be a Town Hall between services at 10:15 am, focused on our search for a new Director of Lifespan Faith Development. Please plan to participate and give your input on the future of our religious education programs for children and adults.

From the President

Lately I've been pondering a question of terminology, and how it may affect our efforts to realize the vision we have for our congregation: How should we describe the generous people who have

committed to handle a lot of tasks in a particular area at UCWC?

Typically, we say they say they are "volunteers." And the word "volunteer" does cover the most important point – that person is not paid.

But to say someone is a "volunteer" may a bit off in one sense.

Often, the person did not step forward and say "Here I am. What can I do?" He or she was asked to fill that particular role. And right now, we need to do some asking. We have some key roles that have gone unfilled for a while – most notably, leading the membership team and leading our care-of-the-building team.

I'm wondering if part of the

challenge in filling roles at UCWC is how we talk about them. Fortunately, we have gotten away from speaking in terms of "leading (or serving on) a committee." The word "committee" is surely one of the most uninspiring in the English language.

When asked to fill a role at UCWC, a potential recruit who is astute will inquire about the "job description" for that role. And if we have our act together, we will have a current one, covering the kind of "work" to be done. But in using terms like "job" and "work," it starts to feel like we at UCWC are operating in the business

need this done; you do it; we pay you. (Except for that last part.)

So, what is a better word than "volunteer"?

Some traditional religious organizations use the term "servant." However, that implies the person is in a position of inferiority — ultimately serving a higher authority, namely God or Jesus. Not very UU.

The term "we minister to each other" is being used by some UU congregations these days. It gets to the deeper sense of involvement, but using "minister" as a verb to describe something that lay people do is not a familiar concept to many. And it's not

a comfortable concept for everyone. Recently when I mentioned it, a very active long-time member almost flinched and said "that doesn't work for me."

I don't have a great idea for a new term we might use, so I invite you to share your thoughts. What's in a name? Would a "volunteer" by any other name be easier to recruit?

At this point, all I know is that having the contributions of a "volunteer," by that or any other name, would be as sweet.




Diversity Book Group Sun, Nov 10 7:00-8:30 pm Social Room *Red Birds* by Mohammed Hanif Led by Roger Bove

From the prize-winning author hailed as "Pakistan's brightest voice" (*Guardian*), comes a powerful and darkly

satirical novel about the harsh, absurd hypocrisies of American intervention in the Muslim world.

An American pilot crash-lands in the desert and finds himself on the outskirts of the very camp he was supposed to bomb. After days spent wandering and hallucinating from dehydration, Major Ellie is rescued by one of the camp's residents, a teenager named Momo, whose entrepreneurial money-making schemes are failing as his family is falling apart.



His older brother, Ali, left for his first day of work at an American base and never returned; his parents are at each other's throats; his dog, Mutt, is having a very bad day; and an earthy-crunchy aid worker has shown up wanting to research him for her book on the Teenage Muslim Mind.

Amidst the madness, Momo sets out to search for his brother Ali, hoping his new Western acquaintances might be able to help find him. But as the truth of Ali's whereabouts begins to unfold, the effects of American "aid" on this wartorn country are revealed to be increasingly pernicious.

Gun Violence Prevention

Tom Buglio was recently invited to Main Line Unitarian Church's Advocacy Day as the UUPLAN point person on gun violence prevention. Postcards were signed and sent

to State Representative Rob Kauffman, head of the House Judiciary Committee, which held open hearings on gun issues in September.



UUPLAN has prioritized ERPO (extreme risk protection orders), which allow families,

friends, and police to petition the courts to take guns away from persons who pose a danger to themselves and others. Unfortunately, after the hearings Chairman Kauffman said, "ERPO will not come up for a vote as long as he is chairman."

In the State Senate, Tom Killion has a bill on ERPO that has a chance to get passed. In a conversation with his office after the open hearings, Senator Killion's top aide said, "we are determined to get this done no matter how long it takes." If Senator Killion is your state senator, please call him at 717-787-4712 to thank him for his determination.

UUPLAN had its semiannual meeting in Harrisburg on October 12. One thing that has become apparent, is that many UU's do not know what UUPLAN is. It stands for UU Pennsylvania Legislative Advocacy Network. UUPLAN has prioritized these areas of Social Justice:

- Criminal Justice Reform
- Economic Justice
- Environmental Justice
- Good Government
- Gun Violence Prevention
- Immigration Justice
- Reproductive Justice

UUPLAN lobbies legislators in Harrisburg to pass laws that benefit Pennsylvanians in these areas. As such, UUPLAN embodies many of our Seven Principles: justice, equity and compassion in human relations, the right of conscience and the use of the democratic process, the respect for our interdependent web, and the goal of a world with peace, justice and liberty for all. It gives UUs a chance to put their beliefs into action.

A new UUPLAN pin to wear – *Democracy is not a spectator sport* – in this election season is a reminder to us all to participate in the democratic process, if we wish to see a better world.

If you're attending and can donate a dessert or snack, please do. Fun, fellowship, food times!




