NOTES FROM REV. DAN

It is traditional, in January, to mark the changes in our lives. This is when we look over the past twelve months, grieve our losses, and celebrate our accomplishments. In January we set goals, make new commitments, and reaffirm old ones, anticipating changes in the year ahead.

Since this New Year's marks the turning of a decade, we look behind a little farther and ahead a little more. The teens are over, and we are officially living in the 20s.

As I look back, it's striking how many changes have come to our congregation over the past ten years. I wasn't here for most of the big decisions, but it's been wonderful to see the results – a beautifully renovated building, a reinvigorated congregation, a stepping up to service in the community all around us.

Over the past ten years we went from two services to one, and back to two. We've created a covenant and done visioning work together as a congregation, and have

begun to find new ways to reach into the community and welcome newcomers. (Hint – every Sunday is Bring a Friend Sunday!)

With the new year come new changes. Our Director of Lifespan Faith Development, Pam Baxter, who has served us for not one but two decades, is beginning to move into retirement. Pam will still be here through the Spring, but on fewer Sundays, and with reduced responsibilities, as we search for a new religious educator. She has worked closely with members of the Adult's and Children's Religious

Education Committees to plan for this transition.

There are other changes too – monthly newcomer information sessions with congregational leaders, new team leaders for Building and Membership, new members, new friends, and new opportunities as a congregation.

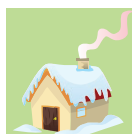
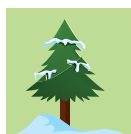

From the President

In the classic TV series “Mission Impossible,” each episode would begin with special agent Mr. Phelps listening to a tape that informed him, “Your mission, should you choose to accept it...”

As UUs on a spiritual journey in a religious community here at UCWC, we have accepted a mission, whether we realize it or not. So, what exactly is our mission?

In 2009, our members provided an answer. At 42 words (too long to reprint here), the mission they wrote back then centers on three themes: spiritual growth, building meaningful connections, and advancing peace and justice.

Much has happened since 2009 — in our congregation and the world — so your board is working on an update. That process will involve considerable spiritual reflection as well as consultation with you, our members.

Our work starts with many questions (This is a UU process after all!) including this one: “Why am I here at UCWC?”

We each have our own answer(s) to that question. Unitarian Universalism is not simply handed down to us by parents or the community we live in. It is our chosen faith, emphasis on “chosen.” (Instead of “faith,” some may prefer “values,” or “principles” or “ethics.”) Whatever the wording, we have chosen to be here in community at UCWC. And in doing so, we have accepted a mission.

In articulating that mission, we can draw some guidance from our beloved Unison Affirmation. The values and themes in it are deeply rooted here, and they will be a foundation for any mission statement we produce. In this work, we will also ask ourselves, “What do our UU values, our UU faith, call us to do?”

Rather than set specific tasks, our mission statement will point us in a shared sense of direction, and it will guide what all of us do here in our beloved community. We want to write it, so that we know how we can follow through on it, but we also realize that pursuing the mission is a process, not a trip to a destination. We will never display a banner proclaiming “Mission Accomplished.”

As the board moves along in this work, we will reach out to hear your perspectives. We look forward to your participation.

REmarks Religious Education Update The Weight of a Snowflake

Last month, our Time for all Ages story described the cumulative power of one of the tiniest, and nearly weightless structures there is: the snowflake. I talked to the children about the snowflakes being a metaphor for people: how, when we come together, we can have amazing impact – impact to make serious, notable change in the world.



We have a lovely example of that in the Adopt-a-Family program of the Domestic Violence Center of Chester County. This was the fourth year we signed up to take part, and we had the largest participation so far: 13 individuals signed up to “adopt” 20 women and children. The point is that while one person could not provide Christmas gifts for twenty people, thirteen people could. And did.

It was interesting to me to see how practical the requests were this year. Clothes, of course, were on most lists, but so were things like a bed for a toddler. The most poignant request was from a young woman, pregnant with her first child. She asked for gifts for the baby: a bassinet, sleepers, blankets, diapers, and bottles.

I could only imagine what it's like to be in hiding from an abusive husband while anticipating the birth of your first child. I was so heartened that we could grace this about-to-be mother with love and support, even though it would come to her anonymously.

Thanks to all who adopted someone this year, and also those who delivered the gifts to the drop-off center.

Statement of Public Witness on Racism in the United States

Working with the Black Lives Matter Subcommittee of the Social Justice Committee, your Board of Trustees has approved the following Statement of Public Witness on Racism in the United States:

The Unitarian Congregation of West Chester condemns the rising tide of hate speech and direct acts of violence against minority populations in our country, which violate the Unitarian Universalist principles of the inherent worth and dignity of all people, and justice, equity and compassion in human relations.

Racism has been part of American society since its founding, through slavery, segregation, mass incarceration and brutality. The impact is evident today in continuing racial disparities in housing, education, health care, the labor market, politics, and criminal and environmental justice.

Our country has arrived at a crucial moment in its history, which offers the opportunity to confront these shameful realities, renew a commitment to racial justice and alleviate racial inequities.

We, the Unitarian Congregation of West Chester, explicitly and publicly pledge to meet this challenge and urge others in our community to join us.

Your Board has also adopted a resolution committing us to help our members understand these issues better, to examine how our nation's legacy of racism may be affecting our own operations, and to work with other groups that aim to eliminate racism and ensure justice for all.

Diversity Book Group

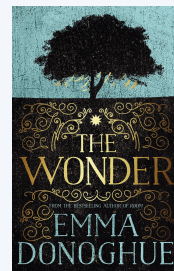

Refugee Resettlement Update

Isaac, Rebeka, and their five children arrived here in July 2016 from a refugee camp in Tanzania. UCWC members were a major part of the West Chester Area Refugee Resettlement Project, the coalition that helped the family adapt to living in the United States. They moved to Lancaster in July 2018.

Susan Brodesser and four others from the Project recently visited the family in their home in Lancaster. Susan reports that they are doing well. Rebeka had prepared a tasty dinner for them and a lot of happy chatter occurred around the table.

Isaac and Rebeka are working the same shift at the Urban Outfitters warehouse in Gap. Isaac has obtained a driver's license, and they drive to work in the Prius that had been generously donated by UCWC member Stephen Johnson.

The three older kids' English has improved, and they are doing well in their school's vocational training program. The youngest continues to have learning challenges but is receiving help.

The family bought new living room furniture, and they have a very large screen TV that was a gift from Maombi, their oldest daughter. Maombi now lives in Kansas City with her husband, parents-in-law, and her almost-one-year-old baby boy.

Defenders of Democracy



The House of Representatives has voted to Impeach President Trump. He is charged with abuse of power by using congressionally approved aid to solicit a foreign power to subvert our election system. He is also charged with obstruction of Congress during its impeachment investigation. This attempt to corrupt our electoral process strikes at the heart of our democracy — everything that Defenders of Democracy is fighting.

Holding the president accountable is the duty of every Congressperson as they uphold their oath to defend the constitution. Our congressperson, Chrissy Houlihan, was the last in the state to make up her mind, but she did vote to impeach.

She stated, "After reflection, I believe it is the right thing to do for our nation, and consistent with my oath of office. I grieve for our nation but cannot let history mark the behavior of our President as anything other than a violation of his oath of office." We could not agree more.

Gun Violence Prevention

Despite gun violence prevention measures stalling in Harrisburg and Washington, there is some recent good news. The Federal Government approved \$25 million in December to study Gun Violence. \$12.5 million will go to the CDC (Center for Disease Control) and \$12.5 million will go to the NIH (National Institute of Health).

This marks the first time in over 20 years that Federal money has been allocated for gun violence research. With 40,000 people dying every year by firearms, it is long overdue. Such studies have been proven effective in many other areas, such as cancer, heart disease, tobacco, and the opioid epidemic.
