

NOTES FROM REV. DAN

Some things can't wait.

When we first moved our services online, I thought we'd

come back together just in time for our annual Flower Service. It would be perfect – a glorious celebration of the beauty in diversity and the power of community. I envisioned an overflow crowd, reveling in our togetherness.

In hindsight, the naiveté is almost adorable.

No ritual expresses Unitarian Universalism better than the flower service. We each bring a flower, we bless them together and enjoy their beauty, and we each leave with a different flower. It is the perfect embodiment of our faith, and of the togetherness of our community. In almost twenty years of ministry, I've never missed one.

As I came to realize that quarantine was not going to end on the timetable I had imagined, at first I thought, "That's fine; we'll just hold it in June, or September, or whenever we're all back together." And maybe we will, but I now suspect that when we do come together, it won't be all at once, and some of us will still be joining online for a while. We can do that. We'll adapt, keep live streaming whether it's from homes or the congregation, and find other ways to include everyone in our services.

But some things can't wait, and there came a point when I realized that we need a flower service now, more than ever. It may be different online, but if we all join in, it can be just as beautiful.

So I'm asking you to help me. Send me a picture of yourself with at least one flower. It can be any flower – dandelions are just as good as roses. Family selfies are great, or everyone can have their own picture. If you don't want to be in the photo, just send a picture of a flower. Hey, you can even send a picture of yourself dressed as a flower. I'll take it all. To respect privacy, we'll make sure the video is only publicly available on the day it streams.

And on May 10, we'll put them together and remind ourselves just how beautiful it is when all kinds of people with all kinds of beliefs come together — whether it's in person or online. We'll remind ourselves just how vibrant our congregation is.

What a celebration it will be!

From the President **Pay It Forward**

Our UU faith calls us to do what we can to help others, especially in these difficult times. I am profoundly grateful



that I have stayed healthy and avoided the worst of the economic damage inflicted by the COVID-19 pandemic. Nonetheless, the federal government is sending me (and most Americans) a substantial economic relief payment, typically \$1,200 per adult.

I'll be donating my federal payment to UCWC's new Pay It Forward fundraiser, and if your circumstances allow, I encourage you to do the same.

Pay it Forward will help our Share the Plate recipients and allow UCWC to continue our good works despite the devastating economic crash and the grave uncertainty about how long the pandemic will last.

In Paying It Forward, you will have three options:

- All of your donation can be directed to be evenly split among our Share the Plate recipients.
- You can allocate half to the recipients and half to UCWC.
- You can allocate all of it to UCWC.

We launched Paying It Forward to help fill the financial void created by the pandemic. We cannot rent out our building, we won't have an in-person auction this fall, and we are still learning how well it will work to pass a "virtual" collection basket during online services.

Your generosity in the Stewardship drive has produced a helpful and much-appreciated "leap" in pledges, and your strong commitment to our future is truly inspiring. Unfortunately, the pandemic is still leaving us a hole to fill. Our Share the Plate recipients face a similar uncertainty about their funding, when many more people need their services.

To help, you may donate all or part of your federal check to Pay It Forward. You can mail it to the office (501 S. High Street, West Chester PA 19382) or donate online: ucwc.org/pay-it-forward. If you itemize on your tax return, the entire gift will be deductible. But even if you take the standard deduction, you may separately deduct \$300 of any charitable donation (including your pledge payments).

As always, we at UCWC are mindful that not all of us are blessed with economic security or stability, especially now. If you need financial assistance, remember that Rev. Dan has a Minister's Discretionary Fund specifically to help our members in difficult times. Contact him at email: minister. All assistance is confidential. Our Share the Plate recipients face a similar uncertainty about their funding, when many more people need their services.




It is exciting to see how much we are all "coming together" right now, despite needing to stay in our homes.

REmarks: Religious Education Update Drawing on Our Memories

A few weeks ago, I asked children, parents, and teachers to bring paper and markers/pencils with them to our virtual Children's/Family Worship. After we finished our usual activities, I invited everyone to take a few minutes to think of an object or event from UCWC that they particularly remembered or liked, and to draw a picture of it.

When we were done, we took turns holding our drawings up to the cameras on our devices and describing our pictures. Here's some of what I saw and heard:

She titled it, "Everywhere, Everywhere You May Go." (From the song we used to "sing out" the children from the sanctuary: "Go now in peace. Go now in peace. May the light of love surround you, everywhere, everywhere, you may go."

I was so moved by each of the shared drawings. They created a beautiful reminder that even though it might look like we're all having the same experience — listening to the same sermon/service, sitting in the same RE class, having the same time after classes to fill — we each have our own, individual experiences; we each have our own memories that we hold dear. And even though we're currently attending Sunday services and RE via Facebook and Zoom, we're still having experiences and forming memories that connect us to one another and to UCWC.

Please join the Sanctuary Congregation Team in supporting immigrants who remain in detention at the Berks County Detention Center, increasing their risk for exposure to the COVID-19 virus. Even though the governor has shut down the capitol and schools across the commonwealth, and county commissioners have issued the release of individuals in the county jail, immigrants remain detained unnecessarily, housed in cramped and unsanitary conditions.


Diversity Book Group Sunday, May 13 (Note Third Sunday) 7:00 - 8:00 PM

The Warmth of Other Suns is about the African American migration from the southern Unites States to the North from the years just after WW I until about 1976. The author follows four people from different places in the south, all from different walks of life, who ended up in different northern



cities where they lived for the rest of their lives.

None of these people knew each other, and their stories are very different. Their journeys had many common themes, however, and often resonate with the immigrant stories we read about every day in our own time.

These people did not know or believe that they were part of a migration or any other kind of movement, and to call them immigrants is not technically accurate. They were all born here, after all, as were their parents and generations of grandparents before them. They simply did what they had to do for themselves and their families. Their experiences set the stage for many of the forces at play today and provide context for, among other things, the Black Lives Matter movement.
