He is the Community Minister for Worship & Spiritual Care for Black Lives of Unitarian Universalism, an organization and growing spiritual community that provides support, resources, and care for Black UUs across the diaspora. He is also one of the co-founders of the Transforming Hearts Collective, an organizing ministry that helps to both co-create spaces of healing and spiritual resiliency for queer and trans/nonbinary folks and resource congregations in the work of radical welcome and culture shift.

From the President

As the pandemic lockdown begins to ease, Memorial Day weekend news coverage brought pictures of crowds, elbow-to-elbow, without masks, across the country, frolicking in pools in the



Ozarks, strolling on the boardwalk of Ocean City Maryland, and sunning on beaches in Florida and California.

Back here in West Chester, we will continue to be extremely cautious before resuming in-person gatherings at 501 South High Street.

We would all do well to remember Philadelphia's experience during the "Spanish" flu of 1918. An early wave of flu deaths had just started, and some cities were growing

cautious about holding large public events. In Philadelphia, a huge parade was planned to promote the sale of Liberty Bonds during World War I. Some leading doctors argued strongly against the parade, but city leaders bowed to public pressure and allowed it. Two hundred thousand people jammed the streets, and soon after, the city saw a huge spike in flu deaths, much worse than other cities that followed tighter health protections.

It is human nature to chafe at the protective measures we are asked to take, especially the limits on our freedom of movement. Each of us is asked to endure painfully obvious upheaval in daily life for some invisible future benefit shared with millions of others. Many among us are thrown out of work and into our country's threadbare safety net, left to worry about paying the rent or mortgage, putting food on the table, and being stripped of health coverage. But the simple scientific truth is that the fewer people any of us contact, the less the virus spreads. And that saves lives, thousands of lives — people we don't know and will never meet.

The *New York Times* tried to drive home what's at stake with a special feature on the Sunday of Memorial Day weekend. The entire front page was just one article – a partial list of those across the US who've died of COVID and a few brief words about their lives. Continued on the inside pages, the Times printed a total of 1,000 tiny obituaries, just 1% of the 100,000 fellow Americans whose lives COVID has cut short. It is sobering to read. (The online version is here.)

Churches have begun to resume services, thanks to intense pressure on political leaders to open up generally, but especially to honor claims that religious freedom should trump the protection of public health. Theoretically, it might be possible to resume inperson services in a somewhat safe way — everybody wearing masks, strict social distancing enforced, and no singing (a powerful way COVID can spread). But humans are social animals and even the best-intentioned congregants will inevitably fudge those boundaries and inflame the risk of spreading the virus.

Rest assured: Much as we'd love to see all of you in person, hug, and reconnect, we at UCWC will not repeat the mistake Philadelphia's leaders made during the flu pandemic of 1918.

REmarks Religious Education Update "That's all, folks!"

When you start a job, you're not thinking about the day you'll leave. You're thinking about the job — what it is, and what you want to make of it. In a way, every day, week, month, year is its own new start, and the whole trajectory of your work ends up being a series of beginnings. Until you come to the end.

There is so much that I could talk about in this last column, and I have a sort of nagging sense that I should be able to leave you with some incredibly wise or inspirational words. But I think that there are really just two important things to say.



First, looking ahead to the congregation's transition to a new DLFD, if I or one of the members of the Religious Education Committee invite you to help in RE, please say "yes." We need to have all our teaching teams set up so that classes are ready to roll in September. I feel so incredibly blessed that events and choices in

my life led me to you, and, more than anything, I want to be sure that you know that.

Go here. After submitting the form, you will be taken to a page that offers the payment options.

Payment Options for Plate, Pledge or General Gift

Go here to see the options. Among them are:

Check. This is by far the easiest way. Send you check to UCWC, 501 S. High St., West Chester, PA 19382. Be sure to make the check out to "UCWC" and write the purpose (pledge and year, share the plate month, etc.) in the memo line. We love this method because there are no credit card or online fees.

Bill Pay. Set up one-time or recurring payments with your bank's website. Use UCWC's name and address. Make sure to enter what your payment is for as a memo.

Online Payment. Go here. On your first visit, you must create an account designating a card or bank account as the payment method. Thereafter you will log in. There will be options for paying your pledge, share the plate, pay it forward, etc.

Phone App. The app is called GivePlus or Give+and is available from the Apple or Google app stores. On some phones you can take a picture of your credit card instead of entering card data.

Text. Text a whole dollar amount to 833-300-0235. The first time you do it you will be prompted to enter your credit or debit card information. Text donations are always credited to Plate.

UUSC Update

Here is some of the work that UUSC supporters are making possible during COVID-19.

- Distributing mobile aid to refugees in Croatia.
- Providing legal aid to migrants in Mexico via phone and video.
- Covering basic needs of Louisiana Indian Tribes facing COVID-19 along with a decimated fishing industry.
- Providing updates about COVID-19 and covering cell phone costs in refugee camps in Greece.
- Delivering food, cleaning supplies, and other basic necessities to refugee camps along the U.S-Mexico border.
- Translating health information about COVID-19 into local languages in the Pacific islands.
- Providing Rohingya refugees living in the world's largest refugee camp in Bangladesh with soap, masks, and other protective supplies.

In these difficult times, I hope you will feel some encouragement knowing that together, we are supporting communities whose human rights struggles are compounded by the public health crisis.

Take Action: Texas, has criminalized any public protests that interfere with the creation of "critical infrastructure" such as pipelines, refineries, and other facilities that extract fossil fuels.

Support the Carrizo/Comecrudo Tribe of Texas who are resisting the exploitation of Native lands. They are fighting to stop corporate attempts to build fracked gas terminals on part of Garcia Pasture — a site sacred to the Esto'k Gna that has been recognized in the National Register of Historic Places.
