

## NOTES FROM REV. DAN APP

This is going to be a very different kind of year for our congregation, as the

pandemic affects all our plans. It does not, however, have to be a less meaningful year, and we do not have to be less connected as a congregation. If our experience so far has taught us anything, it's that especially during this time, we both need and are able to connect with each other as Unitarian Universalists in profound ways.

When Unitarian Universalist Association President Susan Frederick-Gray sent a letter recommending that congregations plan not to have any inperson activities through May of 2021, it came as a shock to a lot of us. That's why I especially appreciated her next sentence, which was a single word. She said, "Breathe."

So, I did, as did our lay leaders, and when we all breathed, we realized the wisdom in her advice. It doesn't do us any good to keep planning a month or two ahead, hoping things will dramatically improve. We need to be able to plan for a year when we are together spiritually but not physically. We wish it were otherwise, but it also carries opportunities.

This is a chance to try some new things and not worry so much about duplicating every old tradition in all the old ways. This is a chance to make adult education accessible — even for folks who don't drive at night — plus you never have to worry about parking. This is a chance to do some serious thinking about who we are and why we are here as a congregation – because we are not our building, and even though we are not gathering in person right now, our congregation has never been closed for one second.

This an also an opportunity to find new ways to be of service surrounding community. to our Some of us are living that service through activities with UU the Vote, to encourage a healthy democratic process in this Presidential election. Many are supporting local food banks, or finding other ways to improve the lives of our neighbors when so many are vulnerable and hurting. I hope that this year we'll be able to explore some of those kinds of activities together, and if you know of opportunities for service, I hope you'll pass them along.

Our theme for Ingathering this year is "Lean In Together," and in many ways I think that will be our theme for 2020-21. Lean in together. Our services and programs are online this year — lean in to that. Be creative with it and have fun. Our country and our community are in need. Lean into that, and give ourselves to service and justice.

Our congregation has a creative and energetic new Religious Educator in Cassie Lengel – lean in to the gifts she brings, as we each bring our own. Our services are online – lean into that, and light your chalice (a candle in a glass is all you need) as we join together. We are living differently than we have ever lived – lean into that and create some good.

#### From the President

As the COVID pandemic continues, we at UCWC face significant challenges, but we are also presented with new opportunities. Your board of trustees,



together with Rev. Dan and the Executive Team, will spend this congregational year working to ensure that we not only survive, but also thrive.

One advantage we have in these strange times: Now

that we are online, it's easier for people to "attend" our services, including long-distance friends or newcomers who want to check us out. The count of computer connections for our online services suggests that our attendance in the pandemic has actually gone up. Online services give us the chance to reach a more diverse audience, as well. Eric Sweet continues to be our technology wizard behind the scenes of the Sunday service. He is the indispensable man. Thanks, Eric!

Online services have already made it easier to recruit a wider range of presenters. On Sunday August 23, we "traveled" all the way to Edinburgh, Scotland, to hear from Rev. Peter Fairbrother, Minister of St. Mark's Unitarian Church there. His message, "Being with Anxiety: Finding a Pathway Through Fear," was a timely guide to self-care during the pandemic and the turbulence our country is experiencing. Being online made it relatively easy to include a slideshow set to music, which is more complicated to do in our sanctuary.

Amid the pandemic, our members are showing amazing generosity toward our community. After the lockdown started in March, our monthly Share the Plate collections went WAY up – averaging about 50% more than before the pandemic hit here. In three of the pandemic months, members' donations to the designated charity exceeded \$1,000. Thanks to all for your generosity. Building on that generosity, Rev. Dan and I hope that we in UCWC can arrange a significant, meaningful service project in the community during the pandemic. Your ideas are welcome.

The pandemic has created a fundraising challenge for us, as we have stopped offering rentals and cannot hold in-person events. The good news is that plans to move the annual auction to the online universe are proceeding well. Steve Sander has been working on the online architecture we need. The person who has made so many of our past auctions happen, Nancy Artus, is still lending her expertise.

We all need to be creative about making donations that are suitable during the pandemic. Janine Galen has pledged a \$25 donation to UCWC for every bidder who signs up to be a poll worker in the November 3 election. Thank you, Janine, for supporting our democracy and UCWC in one fell swoop.

New Director of Lifespan Faith Development Cassie Lengel is already showing off the creative energy we knew she would bring to the job. For the Ingathering service September 13, she mailed a large blank puzzle piece to each of our RE children and youth, who will decorate them and mail them back to produce a mosaic for display during the service. It's a great example of an activity that engages our school-age youths without requiring them to spend even more time on Zoom.

Years ago, Apple computer ran an ad campaign to distinguish itself from its humdrum competitors called "Think Different." (Grammarians would say "Think Differently," but I digress. That's the old newspaper editor in me.) Apple's old message is a timely one for us in the pandemic. Rather than simply try to jam our usual pre-pandemic activities into an online platform, we need to "Think Different." And if we do, I'm confident our UCWC community will "survive and thrive" in these challenging times.



# Stones in the Wall: Social Justice

Each event, each action is another stone in the wall of social justice.

#### Gun Violence Prevention

Tom Buglio hosted the bi-monthly UUPLAN Gun Violence Prevention call August 18. Special guest was Erin Buchener from Moms Demand Action (MDA).

Erin shared that shootings are up 30% nationwide with the pandemic, and that child suicide attempts are up in number. She stressed that trying to change the laws on gun safety is something that takes lots of time. However, MDA believes that we don't have time to wait to save lives, so they concentrate their efforts on practical programs like **BeSmart** for kids.

#### **Election News**

GunSenseVoter.org is a non-partisan organization that evaluates candidates' support for gun safety legislation.

UUPLAN Gun Violence Prevention coordinates with gun violence prevention groups, at the local, state, and National level and has bi-monthly zoom calls. Let Tom Buglio know if you are interested in joining these calls by contacting him at email: gun-safety.

#### **Diversity Book Group** September 13 7:00-8:30 The Water Dancer by Ta-Nehisi Coates

Hiram Walker was born into slavery during the Antebellum South on a declining tobacco plantation in Virginia. He is the mixed-race son of a

white plantation owner and a black mother who was sold away by his father when Hiram was young. The local community consists of the enslaved ("the Tasked"); the landowners ("the Quality"); and the low-class whites. Hiram has an extraordinary photographic memory but is unable to remember his mother.

However, in one instance when Hiram is driving across a bridge, he suddenly has a vision of his mother dancing. When the vision ends, his carriage has fallen into the water. His brother drowns, but Hiram is transported out of the water. He learns that his miracle survival was a result of a superhuman ability he has called conduction,



which transports himself and others across impossible distances. He eventually comes to meet a famous member of the Underground named Moses, who also has the power of Conduction.

The novel debuted at number one on *The New York Times* fiction bestseller list and was selected for the revival of Oprah's Book Club.

Leaders are Elaine Friedlander and Roger Bove.

#### **New Mass Incarceration Liaison**

Pennsylvania ranks number one with the highest rate of mass incarceration in the northeastern United States. Our state also ranks second in the nation overall.

Robin Garrett is the new UCWC liaison to the UUPLAN team (UU Pennsylvania Legislative Advocacy Network) working on issues of criminal justice reform – including mass incarceration. If you would like to learn more about criminal justice reform issues in Pennsylvania, or if you would like

Currently Robin is doing data entry for a voters guide to be published by one of the UUPLAN partner organizations, **FAMM**. It is simple, relatively mindless work but also important. #### **UUSC Update**

UUSC recently distributed additional emergency grants to community partners. Here is one example of a partner in Central America, what they do, and how they will use the grant.

Asociación Pop No'j in Guatemala is responding to poverty and food insecurity and to deportations from the United States and Mexico. White flags, scarves, or rags hang out of windows as a sign that there is no more food in the house.



Pop No'j provides rural Mayan families

with direct support and is spearheading a family farming initiative with youth and their families. Because all public transport in Guatemala is suspended and the government will not provide transport beyond larger regional cities, deportees returning to the country become stranded. Pop Noj's migration orientation workers help them with information and access to transportation.

To address the Guatemalan government's limited response to health services and suspension of transportation, UUSC's emergency grant will help Pop No'j deliver hygiene kits to families and cover transportation costs.

#### **Defenders of Democracy**

Defenders of Democracy supports maximizing voter participation and fights against voter suppression. We invite all who are interested to join our efforts to get people to register and to vote — either in person or with a mail-in ballot. We work with several organizations sending postcards, letters, and texts, as well as phone banking. To help, contact Tom Buglio at email: democracy.

Recently, we joined rallies at local post offices to oppose the recent attacks on their operations that are designed to slow them down and suppress the vote. With all the misinformation about and attacks on mail-in voting, citizens must be confident that here in Pennsylvania – and especially in Chester County – if one wants to vote by mail, their vote will be counted.

The key is to register early, and to vote early. Ballots are sent six weeks in advance, so there is plenty of time for people to return them. Chester County Voter Services will be placing ballot boxes in several places throughout the county. Go to votespa. com to register, check your status, or apply for a mailin ballot.

You can help on election day by volunteering as a poll worker. (There will be a shortage of volunteers because of Covid-19 fears.) We feel confident that Voter Services will follow strict protocol in sanitation, mask wearing, and social distancing to make volunteering as well as voting in person relatively safe.

Because of the huge interest in this election, there will be many opportunities to get involved. Please join our zoom meeting on Sunday, September 13, at 7 pm for our most important meeting of the year. Contact Tom Buglio at email: **democracy** in order to be on our zoom call.
