#### NOTES FROM REV. DAN

What gifts will we give one another this holiday season?

I realize it's a little odd to ask

that question - this year has been disrupted from beginning to end, and the holidays are no different. Many of us will have to let go of holiday

gatherings that have been part of our lives since we were born. Others will be Christmas, and taking extra precautions and dealing with greater anxiety.

Here at the congregation, we're moving Christmas online - and it will be beautiful (the music alone assures me of that), but it's definitely going to be different. And now I'm bringing up gifts.

(I imagine you reading this and thinking, "I can't even do my shopping the same way I usually do. And this guy's bringing up gifts? Like I need more hassles in my life?")

Yes. We need each other's gifts, although you've probably guessed that I'm not thinking about the ones you buy, or even those you make. We need each other's care, compassion, and consideration. We need each other's kindness. We need each other's heart.

We also need to give our patience to one another, especially during a

holiday season that is more than likely to have its share of disappointments, sudden changes in plan and overturned expectations. That kind of thing could leave anyone cranky, and we've been through ten months of it.

## Member Loans Coming Due Capital Campaign Update

The member loans are due at the end of December. The current balance is \$23,000. Pledge and gift donations that come in before the end of the year will reduce the balance on these loans. The remaining balances will be paid off by taking out a new member loan that will be paid from the operating budget going forward.

We have commitments from several members, which will reduce the amount of the new loan, but we still expect a sizable shortfall. Additional campaign donations arriving after the end of December will be gratefully accepted and will help pay off the new loan early.

UCWC appreciates the four generous families for making member loans, which helped cover the cost of renovations while people fulfilled their capital pledges.

#### **Diversity Book Group**

December 13 7:00-8:30 pm Zoom

**Brown Girl Dreaming** by Jacqueline Woodson Leader: Sandy Schaal

Jacqueline Woodson, one of today's finest writers, tells the moving story of her childhood in mesmerizing verse.

Raised in South Carolina and New York, Woodson always felt halfway home in each place. In vivid poems, she shares what it was like to grow up as an African American in the 1960s and 1970s, living with the remnants of Jim Crow and her growing awareness of the Civil Rights movement.

Touching and powerful, each poem is both accessible and emotionally charged, each line a glimpse into a child's soul as she searches for her place in the world. Woodson's eloquent poetry also reflects the joy of finding her voice



through writing stories, despite the fact that she struggled with reading as a child. Her love of stories inspired her and stayed with her, creating the first sparks of the gifted writer she was to become.

#### Safe Harbor Project Looking for a New Coordinator

Rick London will retire as our Safe Harbor Project coordinator at the end of December. Rick has communicated with Safe Harbor staff and organized volunteers to be sure we provide the meals they need as conditions

change. Thank you, Rick, for leading this important service project through a tough year of pandemic. If you are interested in coordinating this very important project, contact Linda Sander, email: social-justice.

UCWC has been providing monthly meals for Safe Harbor since 1998. Rick has led the project for two years. During his tenure, he initiated monthly dinners for the women residents. (We had previously only been providing monthly dinners for the men.)

2020 has been a year of changes and challenges. Although we normally serve 40 meals a month, this year the pandemic has caused the number to vary from month to month. For a while we were making bagged breakfasts (rather than served dinners) while the residents were in a hotel. The residents are now back at Safe Harbor shelter albeit with reduced numbers. We are currently dropping off dinners — but not serving.

Thanks to everyone who works to make this project a success. It takes many volunteers — including youth group and RE who sometimes take a turn — to dependably provide 40 meals a month, 12 months a year.



#### Defenders of Democracy Election 2020 Wrap-up

Now that the election is over, it is time to reflect. 31 UCWC members participated in hundreds of ways in efforts to get Pennsylvanians to vote. Our efforts joined thousands of UU's all across the country involved in spurring people to participate in this historic election, which resulted in the highest voter participation in American History. #### **Sanctuary Team Sunsets**

As of November, the UCWC Sanctuary Team has disbanded. Thank you to Kathryn Racette and Barrie Eichhorn for their leadership.

This committee started in 2017. They provided rides to immigration court and medical appointments, networked with other immigration support organizations, attended protest rallies, held an event writing cards to children in detention, encouraged people to participate in teaching English, and more.

Barrie also did a Sunday service and led a four-session discussion group. He also created a data base for immigrant services in the area. The committee had dwindled to only two people.

## UUA Common Read 2020-21 Breathe by Imani Perry

Every fall I watch the UUA website for the announcement of this year's UUA Common Read — seldom do the titles disappoint me. UCWC has joined other UUs to read *The Death of Josseline* and *Centering*. Many of us have also read *The New Jim Crow, The Indigenous People's History of the United States*, and other titles that have been part of the Common Read program.

This year's book is Imani Perry's *Breathe: A Letter to My Sons*. InSpirit, our UU bookstore, describes the book: "Emotionally raw and deeply reflective, Imani Perry issues a challenge to society to see Black children as deserving of humanity."

I've just ordered my copy. I hope you'll join me and UUs around the country in reading and discussing Perry's new book. The Adult RE Committee and the Black Lives Matter Committee will collaborate in bringing a discussion of *Breathe* to the congregation — specifics will be forthcoming.

#### **UUSC Update**

In early November two category 4 hurricanes hit Nicaragua, Guatemala, and Honduras within 14 days and 15 miles of each other forcing Central American families to navigate the compounding effects of repeated disasters on top of the COVID-19 public health crisis.

Because of our existing partnerships in Central America, UUSC has been able to provide a rapid response. UUSC has committed emergency funds to address some of the most urgent needs and support the disaster response activities that our partners, such as Fundación San Alonso Rodriguez, are leading on the ground. This includes supplying immediate essentials like clean water, medicines, and shelter.

Response teams are also addressing sanitation issues to mitigate water-borne illnesses that result from flooding. Long-term assistance includes bolstering our partnership with Fundación entre Mujeres in Nicaragua, where food insecurity is an issue due to extensive damage to crops. Read more

#### **Criminal Justice Update**

#### **Criminal Justice Reform**

Robin Garrett is now serving as UCWC liaison to the UUJusticePA Criminal Justice Reform Team, whose work focuses on ending mass incarceration, especially of people of color, and particularly in Pennsylvania, which has the highest incarceration rate in the Northeast and the second highest rate in the country. They also work to promote programs to rehabilitate prisoners and assist returning citizens.

Robin also works with **FAMM** (Families Against Mandatory Minimums), developing a coalition of faith-based communities working towards criminal justice reform.

#### **Criminal Justice Live Panel**

The Adult Religious Education (ARE) Committee and the UCWC Criminal Justice Reform Group brings faith development and social action together the first week of December to look at issues related to the recent rise of COVID-19 cases and deaths in our jails and prison.

The FAMM Foundation is screening a YouTube live panel entitled "Expanding Second Chances in the Age of Covid" on December 1 at 7 pm. The panel features Lt. Governor John Fetterman, Naomi Blount Wilson (commutation specialist in the Lt. Governor's office), K. Celeste Trusty (FAMM PA statewide policy director) and Jason Flom (CEO LAVA Media LLC and FAMM Board member). Shortly after December 1, a recording of the panel discussion will be posted on YouTube in case you miss it when it is shown live.

A Zoom follow-up discussion of the panel presentation and related topics is scheduled for Monday, December 7, at 7 pm. Another good panel discussion to watch on YouTube in advance of the December 7 discussion is FAMM's panel discussion on their Second Chance Agenda originally shown on September 14.
