NOTES FROM REV. DAN ♬♬

Here's something I never expected to find on my list for newsletter topics — sea chanteys.

All of a sudden, in the middle of last month, it seemed like everyone was talking about them. "Sea chanteys are trending on TikTok!" people wrote me. "Stephen Colbert talked about sea chanteys two nights in a row!"

I come from a folk music background, and when I was growing up, my stepfather was part of a sea music group that played around the country and occasionally overseas.

This music and the lore that goes with it have been part of my makeup since I was in elementary

school, and I never stopped singing the songs. So, it's surreal to see this obscure music I've always loved "trending" in popular culture. It's a good surreal, but still very weird.

It makes sense, though. Apart from everything else, chanteys are fun. There's something cathartic about opening your throat and letting music out, full voice, not worrying a bit about whether its fit for a concert stage or even polite company. (Remember, this is what sailors sang on ships.)

But there's something else, too

— a kind of longing runs through
traditional sea music. After all, even
a large sailing ship is a small place to
live in for months on end, and sailors

often sang of what they would do when they finally came back to shore, whether at home or the next port.

They sang of love left behind, carousing with friends, places they'd seen, what they looked forward to, or just being on a better ship. ("Pretty work, brave boys!") They sang of the dangers and difficulties of a sailor's life. When they weren't singing chanteys to get work done together,

they sang love songs and stories on the foc'sle deck to pass the time.

Of course, chanteys are having a moment, almost a year into our own period of confinement, longing and danger. We also look ahead to coming into "port." We also fear the hazards around us. We also miss

people we love and the things we love to do. The right song, at a time like this, is literally a spiritual experience.

I doubt the present sea music revival will last very long, and already there are signs it's beginning to wane. In a few years I expect people will say, "Remember that five minutes in 2021 when everybody was talking about sea chanteys? That was different." But for a few moments, we can enjoy together the catharsis of a work song's rhythm and a sailor's longing. And when we finally come ashore from this time at sea, I hope we sing a chantey or two together.

He is a teaching artist in the Kennedy Center's CETA program (Changing Education Through the Arts), a fellow for the prestigious Council of Independent College lecture program, and is Co-President and Director of Music Education for the UU Living Legacy Project. From the President

We're halfway through the congregational year - it's a good time to take stock of how we're doing dealing with the COVID pandemic. Having shifted to virtual-only services and meetings



since midwhat March, has worked What well? concerns have What arisen? will we need to do to be ready to resume inperson services and activities?

The Committee on Ministry will be reaching out through various channels to hear your perspectives. Or you can share your thoughts by emailing chair Shelly Case (email: COM) or me, (email: president). Meantime, here are some highlights from your Board of Trustees' discussion of these questions at our January meeting:

The shift to virtual operations has worked about as well as we could hope. It has been a technological challenge, but drawing on the talents, creativity, and dedication of Rev. Dan, our staff (Thanks, Maggie, Cassie, Miriam and Jason!) and our members - especially tech guru Eric Sweet - we have made it work.

When Rev. Dan is not in the pulpit, we can recruit speakers from literally anywhere (including Edinburgh, Scotland!). We are more accessible to those who don't drive or have limited mobility - people can attend our services from anywhere (including members who've had to move away). It's easy for visitors to check us out without feeling too conspicuous.

Incorporating music in the services takes literally hours of work for each element, but Rev. Dan, Miriam, Jason, and the Spirit Singers have more than risen to the challenge. A pandemic is not the easiest time for a new DLFD to start, but Cassie has added many new ideas for our religious education. Our small group ministries have been an important glue that helps hold members together in community.

On the downside, it is much harder to sustain that sense of

community and personal relationships without in-person gatherings. In the virtual world, it is also harder to make meaningful connections with visitors. Zoom overload is an issue for many adults who work from home and for RE students whose schools are doing remote education. For some adults, participating in a spiritual community


strictly through a computer screen just doesn't work. Burning out our 🎳 a continumost active member ing concern.

On the financial front, we have avoided disaster, thanks to the generosity of our members and aid from the federal Paycheck Protection Program. In fact, we have paid off the loans that members made to help finance capital campaign (though we still have a modest mortgage). Our membership count has held steady.

The pandemic has inflicted a widespread sense of anxiety and loss. When restoring in-person services, we can't simply open our doors and expect everything will be unicorns and rainbows. When we do return to the sanctuary, we are 100% committed to continue live-streaming Sunday services. Some acoustic issues in our highceilinged, hard-surfaced hall may need attention.

There is still great uncertainty

about the path forward. The vaccine rollout has been frustratingly slow. Even when vaccinated, people will still need to follow social distancing and wear masks until further notice. It's also unclear



how long immunity provided by the vaccine lasts, and new coronavirus strains are more contagious and perhaps more harmful.

Throughout the pandemic, your leadership has made protecting health the #1 priority, even as we yearn for the in-person gatherings that help maintain the bonds of our community. Thank you all for your patience, support and understanding as we have adapted to the country's biggest public health challenge in the past hundred years. When the pandemic finally eases, I am confident that we will emerge anew - a theme you will hear more about in this year's stewardship campaign.

REflections: Religious Education Update

Hearts and chocolates are filling the stores around us, and that can mean only one thing – February is here. Right now, we are halfway through the 30 Days of Love Campaign, begun on Martin Luther King Jr. Day and ending on Valentine's Day. This year we are focusing on Racial Justice, as we think about how we live our values, how we show hospitality and inclusion, how we educate for liberation, and how we restore our beloved community, based on recent report "Widening the Circle."

We hope that you take some time this month to engage with the resources – listen, watch, read, and participate as a whole family as we enrich our faith and bend the arc towards justice.

In addition, we have some wonderful opportunities for your own search for truth and meaning. Our children and youth are beginning new curricula, including "Sing to the Power" to teach us how we can stand up for what is right, and "The Fifth Dimension" to explore social issues and what our faith has to say about them.

Our adults have expressed an interest in world religions, and we begin our explorations with the Sutra of Patanjali. There are also our pop culture offerings of "The Good Place" ethics discussion and our regional Minecraft group.

High School Youth

This spring we are adapting our format for High School Youth. We will have their RE Class based on "The Good Place" Season Two every other week, and Youth Group on the off-weeks.

All High School Youth offerings will now begin at 11 am regardless of whether it is RE or Youth Group that week. We will shift our format in Youth Group to a more small group feel, as we delve into checkins and discuss weekly topics together. We hope to see you there.

Minecraft Regional Play

We have been invited to join our local Unitarian Universalist RE programs to a regional Minecraft experience



for community building as well as learning about sacred architecture and our own "spiritual homes." Groups will be split by age range, with one group running from second-fifth grade (ages 7 to 11) and the other group running from sixth grade (age 11) and up.

The groups will meet about

two times a month on Sunday afternoons at 3 pm every other week. Youth would need access to a device to play on, the Minecraft game, and zoom for audio conversations.

How Are We Doing Financially?

In this year of COVID-19, UCWC's finances have remained in good shape. Overall pledges are continuing to come in comparable to past years. While a number of people have had to cut back on their giving, others have stepped up and made additional donations.

We've had no rental income, and we've been unable to hold a number of our fundraising events. Regular plate donations have been way down but partially made up by people adding to their pledges and other donations. We've had very generous share-theplate donations, but many people target their whole donation to the recipient.

We anticipated considerably lower income from the auction due to not being able to hold it in person, but it far exceeded expectations.

Our expenses have been lower than anticipated. Our janitor resigned at the end of the summer, resulting in significant savings. A new janitor starts in February at a reduced level. We anticipate lower committee expenses, and the new loan from a member that was budgeted is not necessary. (See the Capital Campaign article right.)

Thanks to our members and friends continuing their generous giving and gifts from new friends and reductions in spending, we anticipate ending the current fiscal year in a comfortable position.



Our 2021 Stewardship Campaign — *Emerging Anew!* will be somewhat different this year (like everything else!).

The month of March is when we begin to make our pledge commitments for the fiscal year that begins July 1. In preparation for the stewardship season, we will offer Small Group Zoom discussion sessions next month and hope that you will attend one.

Instead of a kickoff dinner, we are planning a Special Concert via Zoom on Saturday evening, March 6, followed by a special Stewardship Sunday service on March 7. Discussion of the Yoga Sûtras of Patanjali



The Social Justice Committee's Share-the-Plate program raises money to give to local non-profit organizations working to improve life for Chester County residents. We are pleased to announce the share-the-plate recipient for February 21 (third Sunday of the month), The Chester County Food Bank.

The Chester County Food Bank is the central hunger relief organization serving more than 120 partner agencies in Chester

County. Through their network of food cupboards, hot meal sites, shelters, and other social service organizations, they distribute over 3 million pounds of food to residents with limited access to affordable, nutritious and culturally appropriate food.



Defenders of Democracy

We are in the aftermath of the greatest attack on our democracy in our lifetimes: the denial of acceptance of the loss of an election by a sitting president who spent months spreading the Big Lie that the 2020 election was stolen, resulting in a violent attack on the capitol building by his followers.

The Defenders of Democracy Committee recognizes that misinformation and lies have the power to deepen the divide in the country. One of our core areas of focus is to combat this and promote ways to check information against non-biased fact checking sources, such as Politifact.org, or Factcheck.org. Americans must learn to accept facts, if we hope to achieve what President Biden spoke so fervently about in his inaugural address: *unity*.

Our committee's 2021 priorities are:

- Protect universal mail-in balloting in Pennsylvania.
- Oppose judicial voting districts for state Supreme Court judges. Take action here.
- Support pre-canvassing of mail-in ballots start counting before election day.

• Challenge misinformation — online, in the media, and from the government.

Gun Violence Prevention

As the liaison for UUJusticePA Gun Violence Prevention, we communicate and coordinate with several other groups fighting for a safer country. CeaseFirePA is the main group in Pennsylvania, and they have made it their mission to create a broad coalition of groups across the state that would work together with one voice promoting three core gun safety measures:

- Universal Background Checks.
- ERPO (Extreme Risk Protection Orders), that take guns away from dangerous people before tragedy strikes.

Report Lost and Stolen Firearms, which helps combat the flow of illegal guns.

Presently 74 outside organizations and political leaders have signed on to this new coalition called PA4GVP, including UUJusticePA and the Unitarian Universalist Church of South Hills (Pittsburg area). We hope to add our own UCWC to this list. Please join our
