### NOTES FROM REV. DAN 5115

In the old days, Unitarian congregations used to close down for the summer. There are vari-

ous reasons suggested for this tradition – in the 1800s it was said that Boston churches emptied out as their

wealthy members fled to Cape Cod for the summer. In more Southern climates, a lack of air conditioning has usually been the culprit.

These days, we continue to meet, and although we now have air conditioning, with online services we won't need it. Instead, summer in most UU congregations has become a time for creativity and exploration, with lay led services and guest speakers filling the schedule.

This year, that's more true than ever. With our services online at least through Labor Day, we can gather with our spiritual community from almost anywhere, and our schedule will be even more filled with a diverse group of members, speakers, and other special services. We even expect to begin

#### From the President



How are we as a congregation doing during the pandemic? A while back, I asked our Committee on Ministry to look into that question. Committee chair Shelly Case and members Emily Sweet and Jim MacFadyen dove into the work, doing nearly 20 interviews in March, using a template developed in consultation with Rev. Dan.



I'm pleased to report that the committee found that most of those surveyed, "felt things were function-

ing quite well given the challenges of the time."

The committee's report was admirably brief, with bulleted highlights. Here is a lightly edited version of their core findings:



### Small Group Ministry

During the epidemic, our Small Group Ministries are meeting by Zoom. Small Group Ministry is a way to gather with other Unitarian Universalists twice a month for community, conversation, and connection.

Each session is organized around a theme and includes a chalice lighting, readings, and questions to spark discussion. Groups are led by trained facilitators who meet regularly with Rev. Dan.

#### **Committee on Ministry Core Findings**

#### **What is Working Well**

- Overwhelming positive feedback about services and music
- · Cassie bringing new ideas to Religious Education
- Small Group Ministries
- Adult RE
- · Religious services committee is running smoothly
- · Social justice committee and sub-committees going well
- Pastoral care is running well
- People look forward to the future prospect of hybrid (live and virtual) service
- Overall, very few (1-2) reports of members being disengaged from the congregation

#### **Areas of Need**

Clear communication and leadership in the transition back to meeting in-person. (Note: The current plan is to resume in-person worship September 12, with details on hymns, social hour, food, etc. to be determined in late August, when Rev. Dan returns from his 2-month summer sabbatical.)

Maintaining personal relationships and connectedness is a challenge. People expressed interest in summer gatherings but are uncertain as to the process. (Note: The Executive Team has since issued guidelines on that score. Click here for more.)

#### **Struggles**

- Some students, particularly older ones, are not engaging in Religious Education
- Online social gatherings (social hour, stewardship) in general not working well
- Hospitality groups (this was a pre-COVID struggle as well)
- Engaging with new people in virtual services
- It is difficult to tell who may have disengaged from the congregation
- Volunteerism, recruiting new committee members is a challenge
- Leadership development (e.g. still need a membership chair)



#### **Black Lives Matter**

On Sunday, June 20, at 7 pm the Racial Justice Discussion Group will host a video presentation and discussion of Connie Simon's sermon at the Evanston Unitarian Church, "The Danger of a Single Story" which focuses on the history of people of color in the UU movement.

Jubilee 3 Anti-Racism Training will be offered virtually from Friday, June 11 to Sunday, June 13. The training includes presentations,

discussions, videos, exercises, and small group work. This 2½ day workshop is open to anyone who wants to journey toward making a stand against racism. Members and leaders of any faith, as well as non-members, are all welcome. For complete information, click here.

#### **UUSC Update**

The Burmese military's illegal coup – led by the same general who orchestrated the 2017 genocide against the Rohingya – has been met with a nationwide Civil Disobedience Movement (CDM). The military has responded with indiscriminate brutality, killing over 700 people since February 1, including many children and young people.

Several elected leaders have come together to create a parallel government composed of the Committee Representing the National Parliament (CRPH) and the National Unity Government (NUG).

#### **Action Item**

Click here to support the Honduras Human Rights and Anti-Corruption Act of 2021. As the NUG works to develop a more inclusive and credible democratic governance framework, UUSC is committed to supporting and amplifying the voices of ethnic minorities, particularly the Rohingya, to ensure that those who have long been denied their rights

and faced brutality for decades are not left out of the emerging multi-ethnic democratic movement.

In addition to our flexible support for organizations working on human rights advocacy and awareness raising during this political crisis, we are also supporting the CDM with emergency grants that have funded physical relocation of activists, communications security, and livelihood support.

#### **Gun Violence Prevention**

The UUJusticePA Gun Violence Prevention Team is concentrating its efforts on working with the Common Agenda Coalition to lobby Senator Pat Toomey on two important issues:

- Universal Background Checks (\$529). Around 90% of his
  constituents support this bill. Senator Toomey sponsored
  a limited expanded background check bill after Sandy
  Hook and has often talked of the need to improve
  background checks.
- Confirmation of David Chipman for ATF Director.
   President Biden has nominated a highly qualified person
   to lead the ATF, which has not had a director since 2016.
   After years of being starved of resources, the ATF needs
   to get back to the enforcement work of overseeing gun
   stores and cracking down on illegal guns.
