



NOTES FROM REV. DAN 53

First things first – here is our plan for the early Fall:

- September services, with exception of September 19 (weather permitting), will remain online while we wait to see the impact of the beginning of school on local COVID numbers.
- For September 19 we are working on a special outdoor all ages service, weather permitting, location to be announced. Please check *Connections* and your email for updates.
- Religious education for children and youth will begin in October. (We could use some additional teachers and assistants – please write to email: DLFD if you can help.) Please see Cassie Lengel's column for more details.
- Prior to the October newsletter deadline, we will analyze the situation and make determinations for our October services, following UUA recommendations and CDC guidance. Any indoor services in October will be limited attendance, ventilated from the outside, be fully masked, and have no hymn singing. These services will be livestreamed for those who cannot attend in person.
- Small and medium sized groups of vaccinated people may gather at the congregation, in the larger spaces and with masks.
- Other outdoor events are welcome.
- We request and expect that all who attend in-person UCWC events be vaccinated, if eligible. All plans are of course subject to change depending on COVID transmission levels in Chester County.

I imagine many of you, like me, have mixed feelings about all of this. We'd hoped that COVID levels would be so low we'd not only meet in our sanctuary every week, but we'd be able to sing hymns together and shake the rafters. Frankly, we wanted to be done with all this, and there's real grieving — with all its phases of denial, anger, bargaining, resentment and acceptance — that comes with the realization that the Delta variant has changed the calculus.

At the same time, we are not where we were a year ago. Doctors know more and have better treatment options for those who do get sick. Because Chester county has a relatively high vaccination rate, our local hospitals are not overwhelmed. We take the steps we do because our Unitarian Universalist values lead us to protect children and others who are unable to be vaccinated, or who are at higher risk, and to put as swift an end to this pandemic as possible.

Despite Delta, we can connect with each other in many of the ways we've been craving for a long time — just not all of the ways. This Fall will be a season for connection, for creativity, and for renewing our commitment to one another, our congregation, and our community.

At our annual meeting in June, we unanimously approved the following Mission Statement:

Have you ever been stuck on hold for way too long? Have you felt that way in recent months? This Sunday we'll reflect on how we keep our sanity, spirit, and sense of humor when our lives are on hold.

From the President

Thanks to all who responded to our survey this month about resuming inperson services. The 85 answers were very helpful for deciding how best to proceed, given the higher degree of risk posed by the new Delta COVID variant.



(Rev. Dan's message has the details on our current plans.) Everyone who answered the question about vaccination status is fully vaccinated – 100%! Thank you all for doing your part to create a strong level of protection for us all when we do gather.

But there was still some hesitance about attending worship in-person, with 54% taking a wait and see approach, while 9% would continue to worship virtually. A tad more than a third -35% – said they would definitely attend in-person.

There was strong interest in coming to an outdoor service, provided that good parking and cover for rain is available. Some 60% of you said you'd be "likely" or "somewhat likely" to attend, with another 25% saying it depends.

Early on, any re-opening will require us to limit seating. There was strong support for a reservation system that allocates most but not all the available seats (74% approval).

The highly transmissible Delta variant poses a particular challenge for protecting our youth under age 12, who cannot yet be vaccinated. In our very limited physical space, there's still a worrisome level of risk for them, even if all others around them are vaccinated and masked. There was strong support for making alternative RE arrangements so that those youths are exposed to fewer people (90% approval).

As is natural to expect, COVID restrictions have weakened our sense of connection as a faith community with 63% reporting feeling "somewhat weaker" connections, and 18% reporting "much weaker." Just a handful found that our virtual operations have strengthened their connection. Nonetheless, we can all take great pride in the fact we are still here for each other, still striving as a faith community to overcome the hurdles COVID poses for us.

Bottom line from the survey: You definitely hunger for chances to gather in person and renew our bonds as a faith community. But you want to do so without encountering serious health risks, especially for our youth who cannot be vaccinated. We will use that touchstone in our decisions this fall, as we confront the ever-changing challenges inflicted by COVID. 

Go Tell It on the Mountain by James Baldwin. "This

is the book I had to write if I was ever going to write anything else," is what James Baldwin said of his first novel, now a great American classic.

In a storefront Pentecostal church in Harlem one Saturday in 1935, the minister's 14-year-old stepson comes to terms with who he is. Through this youthful protagonist's spiritual, sexual, and moral struggle of self-invention, expressed through prose that is lyrically precise, psychologically direct, filled with rage and symbolic power, both unrelenting and compassionate, Baldwin opened new possibilities for how Americans understand themselves.

With a record number of guns sold the last few years, gun violence is on the rise nationally as well as in Pennsylvania. That is why members of our congregation, working through the UUJusticePA Gun Violence Prevention team, are urging our elected representatives to support the Common Agenda, three policies that would help reduce the carnage:

- Universal Background Checks. SB-88, HB-235.
- ERPO-Extreme Risk Protection Order. SB-134. There is no House bill yet.
- Report Lost or Stolen Guns. SB-21, HB-980.

On September 20 at 7 pm, there will be a Zoom presentation on youth aid panels (YAP's). Chester County District Attorney Deb Ryan, who is working to expand the use of YAP's in Chester County, will participate.

Youth aid panels give first time juvenile criminal offenders the option of appearing before a panel of community volunteers, rather than entering the juvenile court system.

A juvenile who completes the contractual obligations imposed by the panel will avoid the stigma and possible adverse effects of a criminal record. Juveniles who fail to complete their obligations are referred to court for criminal prosecution.

I know this personally because I was privileged to attend a trip organized by the UU College of Social Justice, a collaboration of UUSC and UUA. I saw the



extreme poverty. I felt the lack of clean water as only a trickle came out of the shower — water was very scarce to the local community.



I met folks who were workina hard to provide for their families, played with their children, wanted them to go to school, had goals, achieved them. and worked to help others. The experience changed me, and I've devoted a focus of my life to people aet helpina access to clean water. The UUSC helps
