#### **A Note On Services**

Our services are currently hybrid, with limited in-person attendance in our sanctuary. If you plan to come in person, please go to **ucwc.org/sunday** beginning each Wednesday to RSVP. Advance signups will allow us to maintain distancing in the sanctuary, and help keep track of who is in the building in case any contact tracing becomes necessary. We ask that all eligible people who attend in person events be vaccinated, and we require masks to be worn over mouth and nose at all times.

For in-person attendance, vaccinations are required for all eligible people over twelve, and good fitting masks are required for all people over two.

On or near the first Sunday in January, many Unitarian Universalist congregations hold a ritual to bid farewell to the old year, and to release it. In the words of Rev. Elizabeth Harding, "The fire communion separates the end of the year from the beginning, helping us to put in perspective the joys and sorrows, the changes and transitions, the ups and downs of the year. It's a half-way point in our church year, but a celebration of the outside calendar's year's end and year's beginning." In a ceremony of the burning bowl, we are invited to write down words, or a phrase, to sum up what we wish to release before entering the new year.

## From the President

As the COVID pandemic drags on – and we resume in-person activities – what are we hoping to accomplish at UCWC this year?



At our board meeting in November, your trustees considered that question and finalized a set of goals for this congregational year.

Our top priority is to rebuild and expand our connections. We want to bring us all back together, rebuild our circle of care, and restore a sense of belonging in our faith community. To do so, we will

make special efforts to understand the experiences people have been through, while inviting, welcoming, and integrating newcomers and re-engaging members who have drifted away. Vaccinations will be required to attend all gatherings, provided the person is eligible.

Other important goals include:

- We want to sustain current staff and level of operations despite the significant gap we are projected to face in the 2022-23 budget. Our budget will strive to ensure that our compensation honors the skills, experience, and time that our staff devotes to their work.
- We will launch an effort to grow our endowment and encourage planned giving. (Thanks to a member's bequest, we just added \$5,000 to the endowment.)

- We will fill key leadership vacancies and begin the longer-term work needed to produce a culture where leadership is a rewarding way of serving our faith community, rather than a burden that ends in burnout.
- We will hold in-person services as safely as possible with live-streaming for remote attendees. By the end of the congregational year, we will be offering two services on Sunday morning.
- We will rebuild our capacity to offer religious education to our youth and continue to offer a wide variety of programming for adults, both in-person and virtual.
- We will look for social justice projects and community service projects that can help build our internal sense of community. A bequest from one of our members will fund a special social justice project, to be determined when the stresses of the pandemic have lessened.

In setting those goals, your Board was guided by our newly adopted mission statement, which is a touchstone for all we do at UCWC:

> Grow in spirit, heart and mind Love through care and community and Serve beyond ourselves.

May it ever be so.
