"regular life" after summer breaks. This month also marks the beginning of the religious year for Jews, Orthodox Christians, and Rastafarians, and in many ways for Unitarian Universalists as well.

For us, it's a time for reconnecting, invigorating our services, beginning Sunday school, and gearing up for the

From the President

Earlier in August, I was pleased to be a speaker at our Sunday service exploring how we as UUs live our commitment to anti-racism. I encouraged us to try to bring better understanding to others and inspire them to take ______ action for racial justice.



How might we do that?

I think it starts by realizing that most people want to think we live in a good country. We are a country with flaws, no question. Anyone paying a modicum of attention knows we fall far short of our professed national ideals.

But people of good will see those flaws as fixable and are willing to help fix them. I think a metaphor offered by racial justice author Isabel Wilkerson in her 2020 book *Caste: The Origins of Our Discontents* offers a good way to reach these folks.

She asks us to think of our flawed country as an old house that we all share. If you've ever lived in an old house, you know: You love it, but it can drive you crazy with all its issues and problems.

Wilkerson writes:

With an old house, the work is never done, and you don't expect it to be... Many people might rightly say...I had nothing to do with the sins of the past. My ancestors never attacked indigenous people, never owned slaves.

She replies:

And yes, not one of us was here when this house was built...

But here we are, the current occupants of a property with stress cracks and bowed walls and fissures built into the foundation.

We are the heirs to whatever is right or wrong with it. We did not erect the uneven pillars or joists, but they are ours to deal with now. And any further deterioration is in fact on our hands.

Yes, deeply embedded flaws in our government and society prevent us from having a country where people of all races, ethnicities, genders, sexual orientations can realize their full potential as human beings. Our UU values challenge us to be aware of these fissures in our shared house and engage with solutions.

Speaking of which: Nationally known UU racial justice advocate and trainer Paula Cole Jones will hold a workshop for our congregation on Zoom, Sunday afternoon, October 9. The session will explore how we as a congregation will bring life to the commitments we've made in the UCWC Statement of Commitment to Racial Justice and Equity. There is no cost. Please join me in planning to attend. Our UU values challenge us to be aware of these fissures in our shared house and engage with solutions.

Adult RE Extravaganza



Finances

General Reserves Fund

This year we are trying a new method for handling carryover from one year to the next. If at the end of the fiscal year there is a surplus, it will be transferred to the General Reserves Fund. If there is a deficit (expenses greater than Income) at the end of the fiscal year, enough to cover the deficit will be transferred back to the General Fund. If the next year's budget shows a deficit, a transfer from the General Reserves Fund will be included in the budget to make up the deficit. So each fiscal year, the Operating Funds will begin the year with a zero balance.

2022-2023 Budget Update

The draft budget presented to the Board before the annual meeting showed a large deficit, so the Board approved mounting a matching campaign. Pledge increases were matched 2-for-1 and one-time gifts were matched dollar for dollar.

The campaign considerably overshot the goal of \$40,000. The results of the matching campaign are:

A budget of \$358,000 was approved at the annual meeting on June 12, an increase of 4% over last year. Shortly afterward, Mike Miller alerted the Finance Team that there were several problems with the income side of the approved budget. (Thank you, Mike!)

The main problem was that the "Current Pledges" were inadvertently not discounted as is always done. The discount reflects pledges that aren't fulfilled for various reasons (moves, deaths, personal circumstances) and pledges that won't be received until the following fiscal year. The result was that the approved budget for "Current Pledges" was \$271,400 instead of \$257,600, a difference of \$13,800.

The mistakes didn't affect the expenditures side of the budget so it remains unchanged at \$358,000.

The income side of the budget was revised. The missing discount was applied to "Current Pledges". The additional matching campaign offers that were received after the annual meeting were added to the budget. Since the matching campaign didn't bring in as much as the missing discount, the transfer from General Reserves to the General Fund that was in the approved budget was increased to make up the difference.

You are invited to the UCWC Welcome Back Potluck Picnic to be held at East Goshen Park on September 11 at noon.


After our Sunday service, make your way out of town to the Ira Hicks Pavilion in East Goshen Park. (1661 Paoli Pike)

Combat Legal Bribery. Currently, there are no limits on gifts to Pennsylvania public officials from citizens or lobbying groups. A gift ban bill — HB1009 — was approved by the House State Government Committee in 2021, but the legislation has yet to be brought to the floor for a vote. In the final days of the last session, Majority Leader Benninghoff promised that he would have a vote on the bill early in the 2021-22 session. It has yet to happen.

The Absolutely True Diary of a Part-Time Indian by Sherman Alexie, Ellen Forney. Bestselling author Sherman Alexie tells the story of Junior,

a budding cartoonist growing up on the Spokane Indian Reservation. Determined to take his future into his own hands, Junior leaves his troubled school on the rez to attend an all-white farm town high school where the only other Indian is the school mascot.

Heartbreaking, funny, and beautifully written, The Absolutely True Diary of a Part-Time Indian, which is based on the author's own experiences, coupled with poignant drawings by Ellen Forney that reflect the character's art, chronicles the contemporary



adolescence of one Native American boy as he attempts to break away from the life he was destined to live.

UUSC Update

As a child, my sister and I would sling our ice skates over our shoulders to walk to a nearby pond to skate. As a young adult my neighbor's crepe myrtle plant did not survive through Chester County winters. That's changed. Kids can't expect to spend winters ice skating outside and I see crape myrtle thriving in my West Chester neighborhood. In our short lives we see the impact of climate change in small and large ways.

UUSC worked to help communities of Pacific Islanders hold gatherings to share their experiences coping with the pandemic and climate change. There were two gatherings, both in Fiji. They had faced cyclones, sea level rise, changing weather patterns, forced displacement, and loss and damage of community infrastructure, land, and subsistence practices. They discussed challenges, opportunities,

prioritizing, coordinating, and the need to connect policy advocates to grassroots communities to ensure that their voices and needs are reflected in policy decisions.

Community leaders from fourteen Fijian villages gathered in June. Conversations in i-Taukei (indigenous Fijian language) allowed communities to share more context and provided more breadth and depth in the discussions. We risk losing these aspects in English-speaking spaces.

The July gathering had partner leaders and community representatives from seven UUSC partnerships across the Pacific Islands. Read more here.
