Did you know there is a Jewish New Year of Trees?

For nineteen centuries or more, Jewish people around the world have celebrated Tu BiShvat each year,

honoring the trees, their fruits, and the earth that gives them life. For ancient farmers, Tu BiShvat marked the end of one agricultural year and the beginning of another. During the Babylonian exile, it was a way to remember and honor a connection with the land. Today, for many, it's a time to plant trees, celebrate the natural world, and work to preserve the environment. There are even special Seders, or ritual dinners, to mark the occasion. (Yep, Seders aren't just for Passover!)

In our climate, the Tu BiShvat comes at a time when the trees are mostly bare, dormant for the winter. The lushness of our forests has been replaced by a stark beauty, the silhouettes of trunks,

branches, and twigs black against the February sky. They seem almost lifeless, and it might feel odd to celebrate a New Year of Trees in the cold of winter. But this is also the time

when sap begins to flow more freely, as days lengthen, and trees enjoy more sun. This is the season of maple syrup, Japanese witch hazel blossoms, and the first indications of the Springtime still to come.

It isn't just trees in winter. New beginnings often come this way, in the quiet of in-between times, when everything is still, or even bitter and cold. We may be going through a winter of the spirit, when hope seems impossibly

Proposed Changes to the UU Principles and Purposes

Come explore the proposed changes to the Unitarian Universalist Principles and Purposes. This year, major changes have been proposed, with significant new wording.

Rev. Dan Schatz and Cassie Lengel will host a series of online sessions to provide opportunities for as many of us as possible to look at the current draft. The sessions will be based in the draft text itself, rather than a direct comparison with the current Principles.

From the President

For me, one of the great attractions of Unitarian Universalism is our "free and responsible search for truth

and meaning." We have no creed, no dogma.

But if we UUs can each hold our own beliefs, then what holds us together as a faith community?

At the national level, one answer is provided in our Seven Principles. At UCWC, we have our beloved unison affirmation. Both

are elegant foundational statements that leave plenty of room for each individual to interpret and apply in life. They invite people to come to us as searchers and find community together with us from there. We grow. We love. We serve.

A growing current of thought in UU circles holds that our foundational values are too individualistic, that our current principles are merely "aspirational" — because they do not include a commitment to act on them.

In this view, being UU means being part of a community, a community that makes commitments to action. A call to make those commitments appears in the latest update to our



The proposal lists six "shared values" and says we "are accountable to one another" for living them. Each of the new values explicitly says "we covenant to" take certain actions, including, "to dismantle racism and all forms of systemic oppressions."

To me, the commitment to take action, embodied

in a "covenant," with an unspecified kind of "accountability," begins to sound an awful lot like a creed.

True, the new proposal specifically says a congregation cannot require members to "adhere" to a creed. It also says, "Congregational freedom and the individual's right of conscience are central to our Unitarian Universalist heritage."

However, our "heritage" has transformed substantially over two centuries. And one of the newly proposed UU values is "transformation." So I'm left wondering — "Will a congregation effectively sign away our treasured UU congregational freedom by agreeing to "collectively transform" via these new covenants?"



Spiritual Practices

What is a spiritual practice? What if I'm not a spiritual, touchy-feeling person? What are the different kinds of practices? What are you doing that you could share? What helps you make it work? Where and when do you practice? How has your practice been going?

Share-the-Plate Generosity

The Social Justice Committee's Share-the-Plate program raises money to give to local non-profit organizations working to improve life for Chester County residents. We are pleased to announce the share-the-plate recipient for February 19 (third Sunday of the month), LCH, formerly known as La Comunidad Hispana.

La Comunidad Hispana was founded in 1973 by Kennett Square residents, clergy, and advocates as a bilingual social services agency to serve the primarily Latinx population working in the local mushroom industry.



Since then, it has continued to grow and evolve into a multifaceted Federally Qualified Health Center serving southern Chester County. They provide healthcare to anyone, regardless of insurance status or ability to pay.

Their healthcare services include primary care, pediatrics, women's health, dental care, and behavioral health care. In addition to healthcare, they provide free ESL classes, citizenship classes, and workforce development classes. Finally, they have a robust social assistance department, which provides a free legal clinic, assistance with public benefits, case management, and transportation. They do receive federal funding; however, more than half of their annual budget relies on donations.

Please note the following as you prepare your donation:

- All checks should be payable to "UCWC".
- Checks with memo "All to charity" or similar go to the charity. Clearest is "All to LCH."
- Checks with memo "plate", "donation", "STP", or "share the plate" are split 50/50. Clearest is "STP 50/50".
- All other checks go 100% to UCWC, unless otherwise indicated.
