From the President



As a fan of baseball, I am always heartened to hear the magical words, "Pitchers and catchers report." It means spring training is getting started, and months of baseball are ahead. I mention this in a UU context because I think the game of baseball offers the thoughtful fan a

spiritual lesson of sorts.

Baseball is a game where failure is routine. The fundamental contest in baseball is pitcher vs. batter, one-on-one, with all eyes on the two. When a major league batter gets 3 hits in every 10 chances, he's All-star material. If successful only 2 times in 10, he's lucky he's still on the team. On the pitching side, the greatest pros allow a baserunner an average of about once per inning, which works out to a 25% failure rate. Even a great major league team loses 30% of its games. When the definition of success includes so much failure, those involved have to be humble.

In our lives, as in baseball, we routinely make mistakes, so a certain amount of humility is in order. I was recently asked if I were willing to consider changing my view on a particularly hot question. Sure, I said, and I cited a story generally attributed to philosopher Bertrand Russell. Asked if he were willing to die for his beliefs, he replied, "Of course not. I might be wrong!"

To me as a UU, it's important to be open to reflection about what we know and how sure we are about the conclusions we draw from the information we have. Of course, we can't question everything all the time. In navigating daily life, we have to take a lot of things for granted — the sun will "rise" in the morning, that oncoming car will stay in its lane, and so on. But we can use some of our mental horsepower to reflect on the judgments we make about people or situations based on easily observable characteristics or tidbits of prior information.

It is inevitable that we will swing and miss in at least some of our judgments. Even if our mental shortcuts steer us right 90% of the time, we may well learn something the other 10% of the time. And as we see in baseball, a difference of one time in ten can determine whether you're riding the bench or headed to the All-star game.

- If you do not self-test, you may still come, but you must wear a mask the entire night, even when singing.


Stones in the Wall: Social Justice

Diversity Book Group Things We Lost to the Water by Eric Nguyen Mar 12 7:00-8:30 pm Zoom Led by Pam Seres

Debut novelist Eric Nguyen tells the story of a fractured family in the Vietnamese diaspora. Huong and her young sons Tuân and Bình flee Vietnam soon after its reunification, while her husband Cong unexpectedly stays behind.

Things We Lost to the Water takes place mostly in New Orleans East projects from the family's arrival in 1978 to Hurricane Katrina in 2005, with brief side trips to Vietnam and to Paris. Nguyen succeeds in transporting the reader into the family's lives as they struggle to assimilate, to keep emotional and cultural ties to their homeland, and to retain their memories of their absent husband and father.

Take Action Call on Congress to Pass

The brutal police killing of Tyre Nichols has renewed the push in Congress to pass major reforms that will help prevent police brutality and make it easier to hold law-breaking officers accountable in court. The most comprehensive proposal is the George Floyd Justice in Policing Act, which passed the US House in 2021 but died in the Senate. (Details of that bill are here.) Gun Violence Prevention



UUJusticePA-Gun Violence Prevention, is sponsoring a trip to Harrisburg on Thursday, March 23, to meet with our legislators concerning pushing gun safety legislation through the Pennsylvania House this year. Tom Buglio is organizing a caravan and leading meetings with legislators in Chester County to build momentum to pass a bill that would save lives here in Pennsylvania.

You'll meet with legislative staff and attend a mid-day rally on the front steps of the Capitol with elected leaders, survivors, youth, faith leaders, medical professionals, and other advocates to demand change and a safer Pennsylvania.

For the first time in twelve years, we will have a gun safety majority in the Pennsylvania House — and a real chance to pass life-saving legislation.

Share-the-Plate Generosity

The Social Justice Committee's Share-the-Plate program raises money to give to local non-profit organizations working to improve life for Chester County residents. We are pleased to announce the share-the-plate recipient for March 19 (third Sunday of the month), The Family Center of the Maternal and Child Health Consortium.

The Kennett Square Family Center has been helping southern Chester County parents carry out their role as their children's first teachers since 2006. Their bilingual, bicultural Parent Educators use the nationally recognized, evidence-based Parents as Teachers (PAT) Born to Learn home visiting model which equips parents with the information, support, resources, and encouragement they need to provide their children with the foundation for a lifetime of learning.

Parent Educators serve many roles including screening all children for developmental delays and link to Early Intervention services, completing structured home visits with activities geared toward teaching kids preschool skills and involving parents in their child's education, facilitating group educational activities with age-appropriate curriculum, enrolling uninsured, eligible children into health insurance, teaching bilingual parenting education, and conducting an intensive summer-long Kindergarten Transition Program focused on preparing incoming kindergartners and their parents for school and assisting parents with school registration.

The Fatherhood Program helps fathers learn to become more engaged in their children's growth and development, and become more effective husbands and fathers.
