



NOTES FROM REV. DAN APP

I had been at General Assembly for only a few hours when a colleague handed me my first

ribbon of the week. It was an auspicious beginning – when I first attended GA, 36 years ago, the word in the Youth Caucus was "Whoever dies with the most ribbons wins." I don't subscribe

to that philosophy anymore (though I could see many of our youth still do), but this ribbon was worth wearing. It proclaimed, "My thoughts on Article II are too complex to fit on a ribbon."

Article II is the part of the Unitarian Universalist Association's bylaws that currently contain the Principles and Purposes. We are required to consider changes every fifteen

years, and this week, by an overwhelming margin (86.3%), the General Assembly voted to continue the conversation about a proposed new Article II that articulates a set of values centering around love.

While our current principles read like a poetic statement of faith – I sometimes grimace when I hear it referred to as our "creed" – the new proposal feels less like poetry and more like an agreement among congregations about how we want to be in the world. The emphasis is not on "affirming and promoting," but on doing and living. realize that the proposal does not really replace the Principles; instead it creates something new. The seven Principles will remain as important to us as ever, for as long as we choose to honor them. As our new President, Rev. Dr. Sofia Betancourt, commented, "Bylaws are not the only place we hold our promises." She also observed

As the week went on, I came to

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that nobody can take the Principles away from anyone who holds them dear. ("I have never seen anyone take anything from a Unitarian Universalist." "We she observed, are some of the most stubborn, proud, and beautiful people in the world!" She wasn't wrong.) Whatever our initial reactions to the proposal itself, I hope we can

set our opinions aside long enough to talk deeply about the important questions it raises. What could it look like to center our Unitarian Universalist faith on love? What does "covenant" actually mean in our free religious community? Who are we as a people? What does it mean to be a Unitarian Universalist in the reality of the times we live in? How does our faith call us to live in the world?

As usual, there were a million things I wanted to attend and connect with people about, but the Spirit of Life blows where she wills, and I ended up in many rooms, with different groups of folks, all talking about how we can make our Association, our congregations, and overall our UU faith a more radically welcoming and inclusive space for people of all identities.



How do we become more inclusive of and center the voices of Black, Indigenous, and People of Color? How

do we make sure that people of every ability can fully participate and feel cherished in our spaces? How do we support our LGBTQIA+ communities in general, in light of current political decisions, and as people with inherent worth and dignity?

UCWC Members Join Wear Orange Day in West Chester



A contingent of UCWC members concerned about the proliferation of gun violence joined other concerned Chester Countians to observe Wear Orange Day on Friday, June 2, on the old courthouse steps in West Chester. Wear Orange Day is a national yearly remembrance of those lost to gun violence (wearorange.org), organized by CeaseFirePA. The West Chester rally featured speakers such as State Representative Chris Pielli, Chester County DA Deb Ryan, Rev. Daryl Perry of Coatesville (who lost a son to a shooting), and Madeline Barbezat, a high school senior who gave a strong view on how school shootings have overshadowed her life growing up.

UCWC members Shelly Case, Gerry Geiss, Edith Templeton, Kathy and Chris Beatty, and Rick London joined the rally. Tom Buglio, leader of **UUJusticePA's Gun Violence Prevention Team**, spoke at the end of the rally about an ongoing gun raffle (including an AR-15 rifle) by a local political group to raise money for upcoming elections.

After the rally concluded, he led around twenty people to the front door of their local office and dropped a signed letter requesting that they stop the raffle as others left chalk messages on the sidewalk. As a result of many letters, email requests, and coverage in the *Daily Local News*, the gun raffle has been postponed.
