### Diversity Book Group


The Poisonwood Bible by Barbara Kingsolver

*The Poisonwood Bible* is a suspenseful epic of one family's tragic undoing and remarkable reconstruction over the course of three decades in Africa.

A Pulitzer Prize finalist, the story is told by the wife and four daughters of Nathan Price, a fierce, evangelical Baptist who takes his family and mission to the Belgian Congo in 1959. They carry with them everything they believe they will need from home, but soon find that all of it — from garden seeds to Scripture — is calamitously transformed on African soil.

The novel is set against one of the most dramatic political chronicles of the twentieth century: the Congo's fight for independence from Belgium, the murder of its first elected prime minister, the CIA coup to install his replacement, and the insidious progress of a world



economic order that robs the fledgling African nation of its autonomy. Against this backdrop, Orleanna Price reconstructs the story of her evangelist husband's part in the Western assault on Africa. Also narrating the story, by turns, are her four daughters.

### **Racial Justice Ministry** "Difficult Conversations" Congregational Workshop Sep 24 11:45 am-1:30 pm Pizza Lunch Included

Have you ever wondered how to speak up when you see someone spoken about unfairly? UCWC's Racial Justice Ministry group invites members and friends to join us in exploring how we can approach "Difficult Conversations."

As a starting point, we looked for techniques to better communicate in difficult conversations about race and soon realized that these techniques could be used for a variety of unrelated difficult conversations – including those with our family members.

Using the experience and materials of Debby Irving's *Racial Justice Educator and Writer's Transformational Conversation Cheat Sheet*, we put together a 90-minute workshop, open to anyone at UCWC. While we will be using racial issues as our lens for these strategies, you will learn strategies and approaches that can help create respectful communication and enhanced understanding with any person or subject.

Some years ago, one of UCWC's interim ministers described our congregation as adverse to conflict. We like each other. We care about each other. And we want to get along, so it's easier to talk about what unites us, rather than things we disagree about. But we need to be open with each other as well.

In our work together, we strive to be a healthy congregation. We hope you will join us on September 24 at 11:45 am for pizza at UCWC, and after, to explore ways to better communicate in all aspects of our lives, including working effectively together and continuing in healthy relationships, both outside and within the congregation. ### Criminal Justice Reform "Dying Out Loud"

The Criminal Justice Team urges you to take eighteen minutes and watch this powerful documentary. Pennsylvania has the highest rate of mass incarceration in our region in great part due to the excessive number of people on LWOP/ a life sentence without the opportunity to apply for parole. Many of them did not actually kill anybody. Please, please take the time learn about these realities so when our team provides opportunities for you to make calls, write letters, or send emails, you will understand how urgent and compelling this issue is.

Summary description of the film:

Female prisoners in an American maximumsecurity prison explain how they got to be facing Life Without Parole, even though they did not pull the trigger. They serve this lifelong sentence in prison without hope, even though they didn't kill anybody.

It depicts the realities for lifers in prison for decades after they were convicted and sentenced and how the system gets it so wrong focusing only on punishment rather than recognizing that so many incarcerated people grow and change over time and do not belong in prison.

Please watch the video. Email criminal-justice when you are ready to pitch in. As little as 2-3 hours a month can make a big difference.
