



NOTES FROM REV. DAN 🕫

A couple of weeks ago my family and I took a walk by the Cheslen Preserve – one of our

favorite spots for an afternoon ramble. It was a brisk day – one of the first this year that has truly felt like Autumn – and two small bluebirds flitted from tree to

tree in the breeze. As one of them landed, we were startled by a cascade of walnuts. If we'd been a few feet closer, we might have gotten clobbered.

Now, a bluebird doesn't weigh very much – typically less than an ounce. But that extra weight, in exactly the right place, at exactly the right time, was just enough

to shake loose those walnuts. Like the single snowflake that breaks a branch, one tiny and largely inconsequential creature changed everything. The bird itself seemed largely unconcerned.

The past few weeks have been hard for many of us. In the face of truly horrific atrocities and devastation, we don't always know what to say or do. My heart, like yours, aches with the trauma of Israelis and Palestinians, Jewish and Muslim communities that now feel threatened, and all who care about human decency and ending the cycles of hatred and bloodshed. It's easy to fall into a feeling of powerlessness in such times.

That's when we need to remember the bluebird. As small as we are – and in this world and universe we are all tiny – we still matter. You still matter. You make a difference in everything you touch. You don't have to be powerful, brilliant, or charismatic. You don't have to know what to do or even what you're doing. You change the world simply by living in it.

Bluebirds, I imagine, are largely creatures of instinct. Human beings are creatures of choice, and in this perilous moment in the world, each of us can be intentional in the choices we make. Who will we be? How will we live?

We may not be in a position to drop everything and fly across the world, but we can create goodness in the communities we inhabit right now. Maybe that means reaching out to Jewish and Muslim friends who are feeling vulnerable and afraid or who have known personal losses in the last few weeks.

Maybe it means opening ourselves to mutual understanding. Maybe it simply means fostering some kindness around us, wherever we are.

The Unitarian Universalism I have known my entire life has always invited me to a life of love. Sometimes we've been more explicit about that than others, but it has always been there, and has only deepened in my heart as years and decades have gone by. I may not know what to do about the war in Israel and Gaza, or the state of things here in the United States, for that matter, but I do know that if I hold love at my center, I will not go too far wrong, and the difference I make will likely be for the good.

You may not be powerful, but neither are you powerless. When you open yourself to the core of your being, you will bless the world around you.



Criminal Justice Team

While the Criminal Justice Team is not holding regular meetings, we are accomplishing a lot communicating by email and meetings as needed. We are:

- Corresponding as pen pals with people who are currently incarcerated
- Working with other local organizations to ensure that eligible voters incarcerated at Chester County Prison will be able to vote in the November elections
- Participating in Chester County's Re-entry Coalition to ensure that people returning from prison can, like every other citizen, find employment, access stable housing, support their kids and families, and become active contributors to their communities
- Visiting with elderly inmates at SCI Chester (the state prison in Chester, PA)
- Lobbying the state legislature for passage of laws to reduce and ultimately eliminate Pennsylvania's drastically excessive rate of mass incarceration

Unitarian Universalist Service Committee Guest At Your Table Kick-off Sunday, November 19

Guest at Your Table (GAYT) is UUSC's annual intergenerational program to raise support for and awareness about key human rights issues around the world and what UUSC and its partners are doing to make a difference.

Collection boxes and *Stories of Hope* booklets will be passed out in the service. They provide a way for families to participate in the donation process and to get to know UUSC's partners and view issues through the stories of four people connected to those partners, as if sharing a meal together.

UUSC has over 60 local partner organizations around the world. This year's GAYT theme is, Pursuing Liberation.

The four partner organizations are:

- Foundation for Justice and Democratic Rule of Law,
- National TPS (Temporary Protected Status) Alliance,
- ABJP (Alliance for Block Justice in Poland)
- PISFCC (Pacific Islands Students Fighting Climate Change).
