NOTES FROM REV. DAN 51.17

It often happens

in our congregation,

when members and

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through hard times.

We gathered in our sanctuary, a large circle around the room. There were warm voices and

quiet tears. A Transgender Day of Remembrance vigil is always a somber occasion, a hard but necessary reminder of too many lives lost senselessly, but it can also be a time for renewal. As we all shared our reflections on the day, a kind of magic took place.

People who had never met one another walked across the room to offer a tissue and a hug. When someone sang a song, and their voice faltered, a stranger took up the lyrics and melody. Together, a gathering of mourners be-

came a community of hope and love and power.

I've seen it before, although this was an especially moving example. It often happens in our congregation, when members and friends check up on the people they know are going through hard times. It happens when we ask for help and find it. It happens when we break bread together, as we did last month. It happens every time we live our mission to "love through care and community."

Congregations, services, and vigils don't create such moments, although

we try to make spaces in which they can happen more easily. The truth is these moments come whenever we reach out to another human being, not because we know them, but simply because they are human. Every time, it's a kind of magic, and it can happen all the time.

As we come into the holiday season, this kind of ordinary human care becomes even more important. For many it's a stressful time to begin

> with, and events in our nation and the world have made this particular year even more difficult for some.

> Each of us has the power to lighten that burden. All of us can bring care and joy to others

with the simplest acts. It might be a kind word, or an encouraging gesture, or an act of forgiveness, or an act of giving. We may not always see the results firsthand, but when we reach towards others in compassion and care, we create the kind of magic that brings hope. It can even save a life.

There are as many ways to create caring community as there are human beings on Earth. How will we reach out to each other?

From the President



In addition to the honor of serving on the Board for our congregation, I am currently a board member of a nonprofit organization

in Phoenixville. When I was originally asked to join that board, I refused, saying that I just didn't have enough time. They called me back six months later, and I again refused. I told them to contact me the next year, and maybe my schedule would have more availability. Eighteen months after the original ask, I said yes.

Did I have more time? No. Was I expecting to have more time? No. I concluded that I would never have the time, and my life would be just as busy five or ten years from now. So, I said yes, and somehow, I have found the time.

Maybe it's one of those universal truths that you just must jump into something, and somehow you will find the time. Took me half a lifetime to figure that out so now you don't have to wait that long. If you think to yourself that you will get involved in one of the many opportunities to help at UCWC once the kids have grown, once your job changes, once you retire, once you win the lottery, etc., because you will have the time, it doesn't seem to work that way.

Join a committee, become a committee chair, help with a set-up or clean-up from an event, or volunteer on Sundays to make coffee or greet people, etc. No need to wait until you think you have the time. You won't — but somehow, some way, you will find the time and strengthen our UCWC community in the process.

Some of you may have attended training, reviewed information, or at least heard about the proposed change to Article II of the UU Association (UUA) bylaws. You will be given multiple chances to learn more, think about the concepts in this document, ponder on what it means to be a UU, and discuss our values in the coming months.

The first Board-sponsored opportunity will take place on Saturday, January 20, from noon-2:00 pm (lunch provided). We hope to engage in conversation that will be helpful in understanding the new Article II proposal and thinking about what it would mean to our UU identity and to our relationship with the UU Association.

The latest version of the proposed Article II of the bylaws was recently made available and includes amendments that were voted on at the General Assembly this past June. Further amendments may be made to this version but must happen by February 1, 2024.

If interested in submitting an amendment, I can direct you to the process which requires some collaboration with other congregations. You can find the most recent revision here.


Diversity Book Group

Our Columbian Refugees Have Arrived

The West Chester Area Refugee Resettlement Project welcomed two Columbian refugees, Roberto and Michel, to West Chester on November 7. Committee members, including UCWC members Shelly Case and Pam Sapko, have been busy preparing for their arrival by securing an apartment and furnishings and providing them with a huge range of supportive services: food, clothing, cell phones, ESL lessons, health care and SNAP benefits. Gathering of UUs in Harrisburg Advocate for Gun Violence Reduction

Thirty UUs from around the state gathered in Harrisburg on Wednesday, November 15, to advocate for passage of gun safety bills being considered, as well as ceremonies that commemorated the victims of gun violence across Pennsylvania. This was a convening of fifteen different interfaith groups as diverse as Hindu, Bahai, Jewish, Lutheran, Quaker, and more, led by the Episcopal Archdiocese and Heeding God's Call.

UUJusticePA was happy to participate in the effort. From our own UCWC, Tom Buglio, Chris Beatty, Matt Zencey, Edith Templeton, Lucy Demitrak, and Susan Batchelor, joined the activities. Many broke off into groups of five, doing dropbys of Pennsylvania House and Senate members, as well as planned meetings to advocate for passage of gun safety bills that have a chance to pass in this legislative session. They include Universal Background Checks and a Red Flag Bill currently in the Senate Judiciary Committee, and the new Safe Storage bill that just passed the House Judiciary Committee.

Tom Buglio was able to secure a seat at the table with six other faith leaders in the most important meeting with the top aide of Senator Lisa Baker, who is key to bringing these bills up for a vote in the Senate. Tom also gave a short speech at the Press Conference.
