RE Schedule for February



Sun, Feb 11 7:00-8:30 Zoom Led by Lorrie McKinley *Not without Laughter* by Langston Hughes



When first published in 1930, Not Without Laughter established Langston Hughes as not only a brilliant poet and leading light of the Harlem Renaissance but also a gifted novelist. In telling the story of Sandy Rogers, a young African American boy in small-town Kansas, and of his family - his mother, Annjee, a housekeeper for a wealthy white family; his irresponsible father, Jimboy, who plays the guitar and travels the country in search of employment; his strong-willed grandmother Hager, who clings to her faith; his Aunt Tempy, who marries a rich man; and his Aunt Harriet, who struggles to make it as a blues singer - Hughes gives the longings and lineaments of black life in the early twentieth century an important place in the history of racially divided America.

UUJusticePA Forming New LGBTQIA+ Social Justice Team

UUJusticePA is the leading organization in Pennsylvania fighting for UU values in Harrisburg. There were six social justice teams: Economic Justice, Reproductive Justice, Good Government

Team, Gun Violence Prevention, Criminal Justice Reform, and Environmental Justice.

Now, there is a new team being formed. Unitarian Universalism has been a leader among faith groups in welcoming the LGBTQ community for years. It was one of the first to welcome gay ministers and conduct same sex marriages — including one right here at UCWC soon after it became legal. With the many attacks on the LGBTQIA+ community over the last



seven years, there was a need to have a social justice team dedicated to protecting and promoting their rights.

Justice teams conduct monthly zoom meetings with fellow UUs across the state and keep track of friendly and hostile bills in Harrisburg. Our leader, Rev. Joan Sabatino, is our full-time lobbyist.

UUSC Update

Cyclone Mocha hit Burma on May 14 breaking records as one of the most powerful cyclones ever recorded in the country and killing more than 400 people in Rakhine state alone.

Our partner Burmese Rohingya Organization UK reported that the junta failed to provide warnings to the Rohingya to evacuate. After leaving these communities in a vulnerable position, the junta continued to block international aid agencies (including the UN) from accessing impacted areas.

Through our Emergency Response Fund, UUSC immediately provided our partners in the region with the funding they needed to distribute lifesaving aid including shelter, medicine, food, and water. Thankfully, UUSC's unique partnerships with Burmese community organizations allowed us to deliver this desperately needed aid.

Thanks to the generous support of our members who contributed to our Emergency Response Fund, UUSC was ready to distribute emergency grants to our partners as soon as they called for our help.

Now, half of a year later, the road to recovery is far from over. Following the initial impacts of the storm, UUSC has since focused our efforts on building more robust disaster justice plans with our partners, so that everyone can receive the assistance they need at the time that they need it.

Take Action: Call on President Biden to impose targeted sanctions on jet fuel sales and shipping insurance for the Burmese military junta.
