We gather, aspiring to be a thriving, caring, and welcoming community that supports each person's spiritual journey, embraces diversity, challenges us to live responsibly, and is a catalyst for a just and compassionate world.

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This simple sentence, created by the members of our congregation years ago, is part of every Sunday service in our congregation. Like our cur-

rent mission statement of "Grow. love. serve." it reminds us who we are, what brings us together, people when they come and who we intend to be. We call it an "affirmation," but it's really a vision for our congregation as a whole.

It involves all of us and requires all of us. Caring means more than offering a

hand, here and there, although that's absolutely an important part of our congregational life. It also means opening our hearts and minds to each other's truths, listening deeply, and helping to create a congregation in which we can meet all kinds of needs.

How does hope come into our lives? On Easter Sunday, we explore the renewal of dawn – and the second dawn.


### **Minister's Office Hours**


### **REflections: Religious Education Update**

### **Diversity Book Group**

Sunday, March 10 7:00-8:30 Zoom Led by Marilyn Gross Lady Tan's Circle of Women by Lisa See (author of Island of Sea Women)

This novel (based on an actual historical woman, Tan Yunxian) celebrates the real life of a young female doctor living during the time of the Ming Dynasty. Tan Xunxian is raised by her grandparents and mentored by her grandmother who is one of only a handful of female doctors in China.

Despite her more liberal upbringing, Yunxian can't escape what society expects of her forever, including marriage, forsaking her independence, and leaving behind her best friend and confidant, Meiling.

The author does an incredible job emphasizing the significance of our own circle of women and the importance

of building each other up. Readers of all kinds will find something compelling in Lady Tan's Circle of Women as it is part historical fiction, part mystery, part women's fiction.
