Early in my ministry at this congregation, we came together for a conversation about how we have

conversations. In our service and the workshop afterwards, we talked about all the things that we would promise to one another – during good times, during hard times, when we agreed, and when we didn't. We talked about the kind of community we wanted to be. That June, we voted unanimously to adopt our Covenant of Right Relations:

To foster our sense of community and engage with members of all ages in a respectful, meaningful manner that upholds Unitarian Universalist values, we pledge to bring a spirit of understanding, love, and kindness to our relations with one another. We come together through this covenant to affirm our intention to:

#### Listen with an open mind,

withholding judgment and striving to understand others, as we wish others to understand us;

#### Speak thoughtfully,

cultivating honest and meaningful communication by assuming others have good intentions and expressing our truths with compassion and care; **Welcome diverse perspectives and people**,

providing a safe and caring environment, where the wonderful differences found throughout human existence are a source of strength and lead to more rewarding experiences;

#### Approach conflict constructively,

engaging directly those with whom we disagree, remembering our shared values, seeking equitable solutions, and respecting decisions that may leave us disappointed;

#### Enhance the connections among us,

supporting each other in times of need, honoring our commitments, raising our youth ethically, and contributing our unique gifts, as we are able, to our congregation, our communities, and the wider world; **Find joy in being together**,

celebrating moments both significant and small, and delighting in friendship, laughter and love.

We understand and accept our own limitations and the limitations of others, forgiving ourselves and each other when we do not fully live our Unitarian Universalist values, so that we may continue to strengthen the bonds that unite us in beloved community.

Like most covenants, this one is tougher when there is disagreement or conflict – and that's when it becomes most important. With so many strong feelings about upcoming votes at this year's Unitarian Universalist Association General Assembly, I hope we return to these promises we made to one another, forgiving our missteps and calling ourselves back to the community we wish to be.

Yes, there will be different views, and yes, some people will be disappointed with the results, whichever way they land. But in the end, the quality of our congregation – and of Unitarian Universalism – will be measured far more by how we live our faith than how we describe it.

And remember, whatever your views on the big UU questions of the day, whether you don't know what to think, have strong opinions, or don't particularly care, you are part of this community, and you are loved.

## **Social Justice**

#### Advocacy Day for Gun Violence Prevention in Harrisburg

Tuesday, May 7, turned out to be a beautiful, blue sky day in Harrisburg and a great day for lobbying our elected reps for gun safety. UUjusticePA joined 50 other organizations

and over 560 allies for CeaseFirePA Advocacy Day with 25+ members of our own, including Rick London and Tom Buglio from UCWC.

We had a chance to say thank you to our reps who are on board, and do "drop bys" to the reps and



senators who are not — including Chester County's Rep. John Lawrence, and the three Pennsylvania senators who are holding up action on the three good bills that have already been voted out of the House.

However, we left Harrisburg in disappointment: two good gun safety bills were voted on that afternoon in the House and lost by one vote.

What can we do to get good gun safety bills passed? Support those running for office who champion Gun Safety. Keep in mind that days like May 7 still lay the groundwork for success and are well worth doing. We enjoyed meeting and lobbying with fellow UUs and others across the state, and we get inspiration and energy from all of those who care about this work.

On June 19, 1865, nearly two years after President Abraham Lincoln emancipated enslaved Africans in America, Union troops arrived in Galveston Bay, Texas with news of freedom. More than 250,000 African Americans embraced freedom by executive decree in what became known as Juneteenth or Freedom Day. — National Museum of African American History

Juneteenth was made a federal holiday in 2021.
